Back in 1955, Niagara-on-the Lake, Ontario was the showplace for World Scouting as Canada hosted the 8th World Jamboree. Thousands of Canadians still recall this great event when 10,000 Scouts from 50 countries camped together for the first time a World Jamboree had been held outside of Europe.

Now, some 28 years later, Canada has the privilege of hosting the 15th World Jamboree at Kananaskis Country Alberta. We are indeed honoured not only to host an International event of this mangitude, but also to do so in celebration of the 75th Anniversary of Scouting.

A significant difference, in addition to the international flavour, is an International village of marquees known as the "Gateway to the World" of Scouting. Here Scouts from every land can meet, visit displays, experience radio and electronics, exchange stamps and badges and much more!

The 15th World Jamboree will feature participants from around the world to take part in an adventure of world unity and Scout brotherhood in an atmosphere of fun, good fellowship, challenge and achievement.

Don't let your boys miss this once in a lifetime opportunity!
