Collision of views Removing parking meter sparks debate

A letter Midland Public Safety Committee received that was forwarded to local policy-makers from the Midland BIA sparked a confrontation of philosophies between Reeve Bev Day and Alderman Nancy Keefe when the matter was brought before council this week.

The BIA pointed out a concern it has that the parking spot on Hugel Avenue East immediately before the east service lane to the rear of the Dominion Store constitutes a hazard as vision is shomewhat impaired by those turning onto Hugel.

Chief Ernest Bates, following his own observation of the situation, is reported to have told the Public Safety Committee, there indeed is a problem notably compounded by the traffic of delivery trucks at the rear of the Dominion Store.

The committee recommended the parking spot be eliminated, a No Parking sign be installed and that the Parking Authority take immediate steps to rectify the situation.

Reeve Day was quick to point out, "This will be one more parking meter that is taken out (in the town)"

He said, "It's tough to come up with the money to pay for parking lots" when something like this happens. He suggested the BIA cover the cost of the loss of revenue the meter would generate.

However, Alderman Keefe would have nothing of this. She stressed Midland's number one concern "should be safety".

In endorsing removal of the parking meter, Mrs. Keefe observed, "They (the BIA) are saying it is an unsafe thing."
