**Wind topples tree
house misses heavy damage**

The Gravelle family of Lafontaine Road, Penetanguishene, will long remember Easter weekend 1983.

Saturday evening part of one of two evergreens in front of their home

came crashing down thanks to a gale force easterly wind.

The huge bow slammed into a nearby tree, smashed into the home's chimney and then brushed the house

before coming to rest with a roaring thud.

Janet Gravelle, a Grade 12 student at ESPSS, was the only occupant in the home when the mishap occurred.

"It made a big noise. I could feel the earth move," she said in describing her experience.

The incident is said to have occurred at 8:45 p.m., Saturday.

Tiny pays VON its shortfall

Tiny Township council has authorized the payment of a requested \$21.15 to the Simcoe County branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses.

The order provides home nursing care for people who would otherwise have to go into hospital. Most of the order's expenses are recoverable from sources such as the United

Way, but not all costs are recoverable.

The \$21.15 represents expenses incurred by the order in the township during 1982 which the order cannot recover from any other source.

Province promises \$40,000 to airport

The majority of the cost of preparing a master plan for Huronia Airport, and of the cost of buying 37 acres of land to allow extension of the airport runway, will be paid by the province.

The estimated costs are \$10,000 for the airport master plan, and \$40,000 for the acquisition of the 37 acres of land.

The Ministry of Transportation and Communications, and the Board of Industrial Leadership and Development will jointly provide \$8,000 and \$32,000.
