

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Under the 'B'...bingo!

Dear Editor:

A letter to the editor and an article in last week's edition of The Free Press prompt me to air my views on the bingo issue and make a few points for your readers assessments.

In my opinion "bingo parlours" commercialize bingo and exploit groups who would raise funds by this method. These ventures are quite profitable for the owners or operators as illustrated by the magnitude of the investment that Mr. Smith is able to make in renovating the Roger Hunter building. His persistance in proceeding, in spite of the opposition he is encountering, further illustrates that he expects big profits with the help of groups who might join him.

Community benefits from this enterprise will only be a spin off and the size of the spin off will obviously depend on how many (bingo) players attend each bingo. Which leads up to the following point—

The carrot that Mr. Smith is dangling to entice groups is based on his operations in New Market and Vespra Township (Barrie). These areas have much greater populations than this area. I do not think that the bingo population here is large enough to make his operation so profitable for clubs and organizations who contemplate joining him. Remember he is talking 6-7 bingos per week and there are already at least 5 in the area at present.

Which brings up another point, what will happen to the attendance at other bingos? No doubt the

bingo parlour will offer better prizes to entice the bingo players away. Will some groups be so inconsiderate that they will seek licenses for evenings that other bingos are operating? If they do so they will jeoparidize existing fund raising projects which are addressing community needs. I use one example of the Odd Fellows who depend on their Saturday bingo (since 1947) to support their building as well as aids for the handicapped.

Groups who might choose to operate bingo in opposition to others, would do well to consider that they would also jeopardize community spirited relationships.

Through all this, myself and my club (Civitan) appear to have a "Sour grapes" attitude and look like "dogs in the manger" but we feel that in opposing the bingo parlour we have the community interest at heart.

We would expect the attendance at our bingo to drop if Mr. Smith opens, however, we are in a competitive position and are not too concerned about settling for lesser proceeds for our trust account. The records for our bingo operations are at the municipal office for anyone to see. They will show that the only commercial enterprise that benefits from our bingo is the supplier of the sheets and equipment. We feel that the biggest slice possible of the bingo players dollar should go back into the community.
