instruction.

It was established in September of 1980 as the result of the formation of a Roman Catholic Separate School zone in Penetanguishene.

Accommodation for the school has been provided in a sharing arrangement with the Simcoe County Board of Education.

As Ecole St. Louis grew, the sharing arrangement became pressured. The new capital allocation will provide for the school to be a distinct entity on its own.
