Dear Mr. Maurice,

Let me say clearly that 2,4-D and dichlorprop herbicides are safe chemicals if used properly. It amazes me how some people can on the one hand freely suggest the use of chemical antidotes for bee stings or for poison ivy or not be troubled at all about exposure to phenolic compounds in poison ivy or other poisonous weeds and on the other hand be so emotionally fearful of 2,4-D or dichlorprop.

These two herbicides are synthetic phenoxy acetic acid versions of a natural plant hormone called indole acetic acid which we consume any time we consume fresh vegetables.

Phenoxy acetic acids are metabolized more slowly than indole acetic acids in plants however they are broken down quickly by soil microoorganisms and in sunlight. It is theoretically possible for them to contain trace levels of some contaminants called dioxins but it is almost chemically impossible for them to contain the notorious TCDD, the dioxin that can occur in minute amounts in some formulations of 2,4,5-T. These other dioxins can be many thousands of times less active than TCDD.

The International Agency for Research on Cancer continues to update its information on pesticides and it does not regard the phenoxy herbicide 2,4-D to be a potential carcinogen.

I think we can all agree that it is difficult to prove that any chemical (vitamins or whatever) is absolutely not carcinogenic. We hear recently that gasoline may be carcinogenic and researchers are trying to assess the risk of self serve gas stations.

What is the risk to workmen who operate some of the new gas powered weed cutters as suggested by Mr. Ogilvie (exposure to fumes, physical injury)?

In some of our own research we have shown that immediately after spraying turfgrass with 2,4-D only 3 or 4 per cent is dislodgable by physically rubbing the grass blades with moistened cheese of the Surgeon Bay

After two or three days or after the first rainfall, dislodgable residues are 0.01 per cent or less. 2,4-D does not readily penetrate human skin and the small proportion that does enter the body is very quickly excreted in the urine in one or two days.

When we consider its lack of mammalian toxidity, its non persistence, and its inability to accumulate in mammalian systems, I don't agree that its proper use in parks or on roadsides poses a risk to anyone except rare super sensitive individuals.

I am not in favor of blanket spraying of roadsides.

I do believe that herbicides are important chemical tools that can be used to reduce parkland and road maintenance costs and to improve road safety. The best approach is to have a program for advance monitoring of areas that may be sprayed. In this way it is possible to locate sensitive crops and landscape areas, water crossings, areas where spraying is not needed and areas where citizens will agree to control noxious weeds or otherwise problem vegetation themselves.
