Mayor wants position clarified seeking advice from Queen's Pk.

Midland Mayor Al Roach was in the "Big Smoke" yesterday.

While in Toronto, the town's chief executive officer was to have met with solicitors from the provincial Ministry of Municipal Affairs to learn if he as the town's mayor legally should have been kicked off Midland's annexation committee.

It is expected he will also discuss with officials there, his so-called "open door policy" and other matters related to his tenure in office to date and the number of roadblocks that have been placed in his path.

He was also to compete in the mayors' annual bathtub race later in the day at the CNE.

Since taking office late last year, Mayor Roach has been the object of a movement to have him impeached for going public on matters relating to Midland's bid to annex 2,600 acres of prime real estate along Highway 93 from the Township of Tiny.

During a recent heated council meeting the mayor was thrown off the annexation committee and has been visibly annoyed ever since.

However last week, the mayor confirmed, despite the fact that he had been kicked off the committee he would continue speaking out against Midland's so-called "land grab."

The land in question runs along "the golden mile" south of Penetanguishene and just west of Midland.

TV Ontario proposes children's channel

On Monday, 15 August TVOntario filed an application with the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) for a licence to operate a full-day national children's cable television service. The service will be called GALAXIE.

GALAXIE promises to meet the need in Canada for high-quality programming designed especially for children. It will also contribute substantially to the development of a world-class Canadian industry for production of children's television programs.

One of TVOntario's responsibilities, and one reason for TVO's excellent reputation, is its provision of programs that meet the developmental needs of Ontario children two to 14 years of age. These programs are sold outside Ontario, and

seen by children in Canada, the U.S.A., and many other countries.

GALAXIE, which will be a self-financing, commercial-free undertaking operated by TVOntario, can be economically viable only if offered nationally. It will expand and enrich the existing TVO hours of service to Ontario children and, at the same time, meet the developmental needs of children across Canada, by offering proved, research-based, high-quality programs, in English and in French, designed especially for them.

GALAXIE will be a 12-hour service, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday to Friday, and five hours, 7 a.m. to 12 noon, Saturday and Sunday. It will be distributed to cable systems across Canada via Anik C3 satellite.
