



# Cardinal Carter approves plans for Papal Altar for the Shrine

## Preparing for Pope's visit to Huronia

Plans for a Papal Altar at Martyrs' Shrine were approved in Toronto last week by His Eminence Cardinal Carter.

Designed by Father Toby McGivern, with the assistance of Father Stephan Dubas, S.J., both of

Montreal, the altar when constructed early in the spring will measure 60 feet wide and 40 feet in height.

It will be located on a 23.3 acre site at the Shrine and will be used as a permanent structure following the

Papal Visit to Huronia on Sept. 15 by Pope John Paul II.

To be made of natural materials, the "A" frame designed structure will feature as its centre-piece a throne chair.

A painting of the Canadian

Martyrs by Father Toby McGivern will also be featured on the altar.

And, although the Pontiff will not be saying mass during his visit to the Shrine, one is to be held shortly after the Holy Father departs the Midland area for Toronto.

## Margarine is not butter, even in 1984

Ontario Milk Marketing Board Chairman Ken McKinnon accused marketers of dairy substitutes of the deception of "Doublethink" and "Newspeak" in a reference to George Orwell's 1984. Speaking to about 700 representatives of the province's dairy farmers at this year's OMMB Annual Meeting

in Toronto, he warned of an impending battle over imitations, saying, "Contrary to George Orwell's prophecies, war is still not peace; neither is margarine butter; vegetable based "creamers" and "powders" are certainly not cream and milk". He went on to say that "some of the promoters of imitations would have people believe their substitutes were the real thing, or that they were better than the real thing."

McKinnon outlined a province-wide monitoring system to help check any incidence of false labelling or ad-

vertising. McKinnon also stressed the need for the Board to continue to maintain the high credibility it has tried to establish and outlined Board plans for the coming year. He reviewed plans regarding milk marketing, fresh milk testing, multiple component pricing, technology and future planning. Referring to the fall low production period and its effect on cheese and butter manufacturers, McKinnon announced near completion of a study by Dr. Bob Marshall and Prof. Stewart Lane which had

been commissioned by the Board.

Other speakers at the Annual Meeting included Gilles Choquette, Chairman of the Canadian Dairy Commission; J. Grant Smith, President of Dairy Farmers of Canada and Vice-Chairman of the OMMB; James "Tom" Camerlo, United Dairy Industry and Association in the United States; Ross Daily of CFPL-TV who addressed the Annual Meeting Banquet on public relations in agriculture.

### WHAT DOCUMENTS WILL MY FAMILY NEED AT THE TIME OF MY DEATH?

One of the most frustrating responsibilities of a spouse or family at the time of death can be that of locating important papers and documents. A current and updated listing of these papers can be of benefit to survivors.

This is a difficult activity for anyone to do because no one really wants to anticipate death or even prepare for it. On the other hand, you would be doing a real service to your family if you follow through on this. Make a list of your documents, indicating where each is.

The type of such papers and documents, along with locations, might include: (1) your will; (2) Canada Pension Plan papers; (3) cemetery deed; (4) insurance policy; (5) such certificates as birth, marriage, organization and or union membership, educational, military; (6) bank accounts and safety deposit boxes; (7) financial papers such as mortgages, contracts, promissory notes, negotiable papers, stocks, bonds, trust funds; and (8) all recent tax returns.

Sometimes this turns up information about assets, either forgotten or not known by the survivors.
