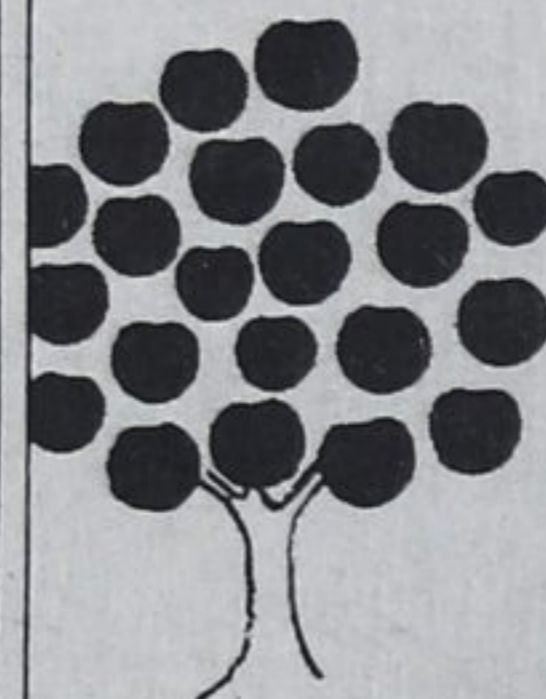

Hydro-electric commissioners (over 1,400 of 'em) are to meet

Over 1,400 municipal hydro-electric commissioners and senior management personnel will attend the 1984 Annual Meeting of the Ontario Municipal Electric Association (O.M.E.A.) which gets underway on Sunday, Feb. 26, at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto.

The O.M.E.A. represents more than 320 municipal electrical utilities who supply electrical energy to over 2,200,000 residential, commercial and industrial customers who consume two-thirds of the electrical power in Ontario.

Members of the O.M.E.A. vigorously support the expedient approvals of those projects necessary to ensure reliable elec-

trical service to all parts of the province, advocate the improvement of Ontario Hydro's debt-equity ratio to ensure financial soundness, and believe that any monies borrowed for the development of the Bruce Energy Centre be clearly identified and do not become an additional debt burden to electrical customers.

Annual Meeting delegates will deliberate on resolutions that originated from within the nine O.M.E.A. Districts across the province. The resolutions will consolidate the Association's viewpoint on a broad range of subjects related to the costing and pricing of

electricity, employee safety and the steps necessary to assure the continuance of electrical service.

Speakers during the meeting will include: Milan Nastich, Chairman of Ontario Hydro; the Hon. Philip Andrewes, Minister of Energy; and Dr. Margaret N. Maxey, Director, Chair of Free Enterprise, University

of Texas.

Three speakers will participate in a presentation entitled, "Marketing Electricity". A municipal outlook will be provided by Ronald A. Noonan, P. Eng., General Manager and Secretary, Oakville Hydro. The provincial outlook will be presented by Dane B.

MacCarthy, Vice-President, Marketing, Ontario Hydro. The keynote speaker, Philip D. Steffen, will address the topic, "Successful Marketing".

The Annual Meeting is held in conjunction with that of the Association of Municipal Electrical Utilities (of Ontario) (AMEU).
