"The team will remain intact for next season," Canton added. Both Gary and Brian also expressed their gratitude to the local and provincial organizers of the School Boy event.

"The meals and the hospitality of Midland is fantastic," Campbell said. "Bill Howard and his crew did an excellent job with the ice surface. It was an all round great tournament,'' added Campbell.

Host Chairperson, Edythe Clark said the tournament ran without a hitch and everyone was very cooperative.

"The calibre of curling was just excellent," Clark said Monday. "So many people were involved with the organization of this event, which made everyone's job easy," Clark added.
