

Police Beat

Midland OPP have charged a 20-year-old Midland resident with aggravated assault following a weekend incident in Port McNicoll.

According to OPP, police were called to the parking lot of Port McNicoll Legion early Sunday morning to investigate a disturbance.

Involved subjects, police later reported, had dispersed before OPP arrived.

However, it was discovered that Robert Quesnelle, 31, of Port McNicoll had been stabbed twice with what was believed to have been a knife.

He received treatment at HDH for two wounds, one to the lower abdomen and one to the left thigh.

Terry Brian Corbier of Borden Cr., Midland, has been charged.

He was lodged in custody in Barrie jail following his arrest Sunday morning.

He was held over until tomorrow.

During the period April 2 - 9, Midland OPP handled a total of 70 general occurrences.

Midland OPP investigated five motor-vehicle accidents during the week ending April 9, reports OPP Const. Murray Cooper, the local detachment's community services officer.

One of the crashes involved minor personal injuries while another was classified as a "fail to remain."

During the month of March, Midland police personnel probed a total of 17 reportable and 14 non-reportable motor-vehicle accidents on town streets.

As a result of some of these mishaps, a total of 13 persons received personal injuries.

Last month, Midland police laid 29 charges under the Criminal Code of Canada, three under the Liquor Licence act and 81 under the Highway Traffic Act including 63 for speeding.

In March of this year, Midland Police Department was called upon to investigate a total of 409 complaints.

The information is contained in a report prepared by Police Chief Ernest Bates and tabled at this week's council meeting.

Crime didn't take a holiday in Midland last month, police records show.

Police here probed six house break-ins and an equal number of shop break-ins.

Midland council briefs

Midland Police Chief Ernest Bates has been given permission to attend the annual conference of police chiefs in Timmins, June 25 through June 28.

The public safety committee budget submitted to the finance committee is 3.47 per cent higher than last year's budgeted figure.

The 1984 budget will have a special section for spending related to the papal visit.

Fire Chief Hal Belfry submitted two budgets to the public safety committee. The budget using the present number of firefighters as a base was accepted.

The fire chief is to meet again with the public safety committee to explain a budget including an increase in the number of firefighters.

The town council has accepted the town public safety committee's recommendation that four members of the department may be promoted to the rank of captain, providing that they are qualified.

A new bylaw to control what goes into the town's sewers, if enforced, will help the town dispose of sludge from the town's water pollution control plant.

If the quantity of chromium, nickel, and zinc being dumped by local industries can be reduced to the levels noted in the bylaw, sludge from the water pollution control plant may be dumped, without treating, on agricultural land.

The Midland public works department plans to spend more than \$100,000 on equipment. A new snowplow, a utility truck, an asphalt roller and radio equipment are some of the items.

Keenan's Department Store of Midland won the right to sell the town long sleeve shirts, trousers and coveralls for 20 public works employees.

As the result of a meeting March 22 between representatives of Fourth Street residents and public works chairman Deputy-reeve Claude Buck, the deputy-reeve said the town will maintain Fourth Street between Bay Street and Vinden Street, and that he would ask for more enforcement of the speed limit in that area.

The cost of alternatives to continued use of that section of Fourth Street by trucks was given to the representatives.

Midland's engineering technician Ken Cave will attend the 1984 conference in Toronto, which runs April 29 through May 2, of the

Ontario Traffic Conference.

Jim Murray, chief operator of the town's water pollution control plant, and operator John Boucher, will attend an industrial waste discharge seminar on May 15 in

Toronto.

Commissioner of Works Percy Ehler is going to Edmonton to attend the American Public Works Association conference and equipment meeting and the North American Snow Conference, which

runs May 13 to May 17.

The North Simcoe Waste Management Association will pay half of the cost of Ehler's attendance. Ehler is a consultant to the NSWMA. Waste management issues will be addressed.

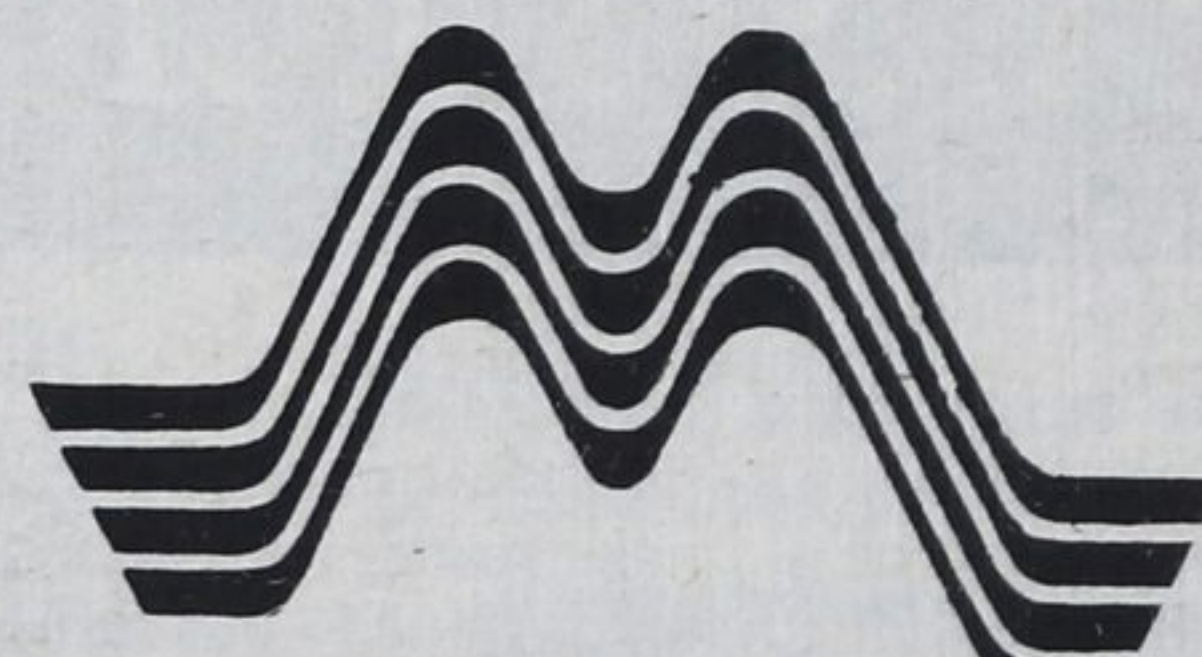

The public is invited to attend. Admission is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children. For more information, call 526-5365 or 534-3822.



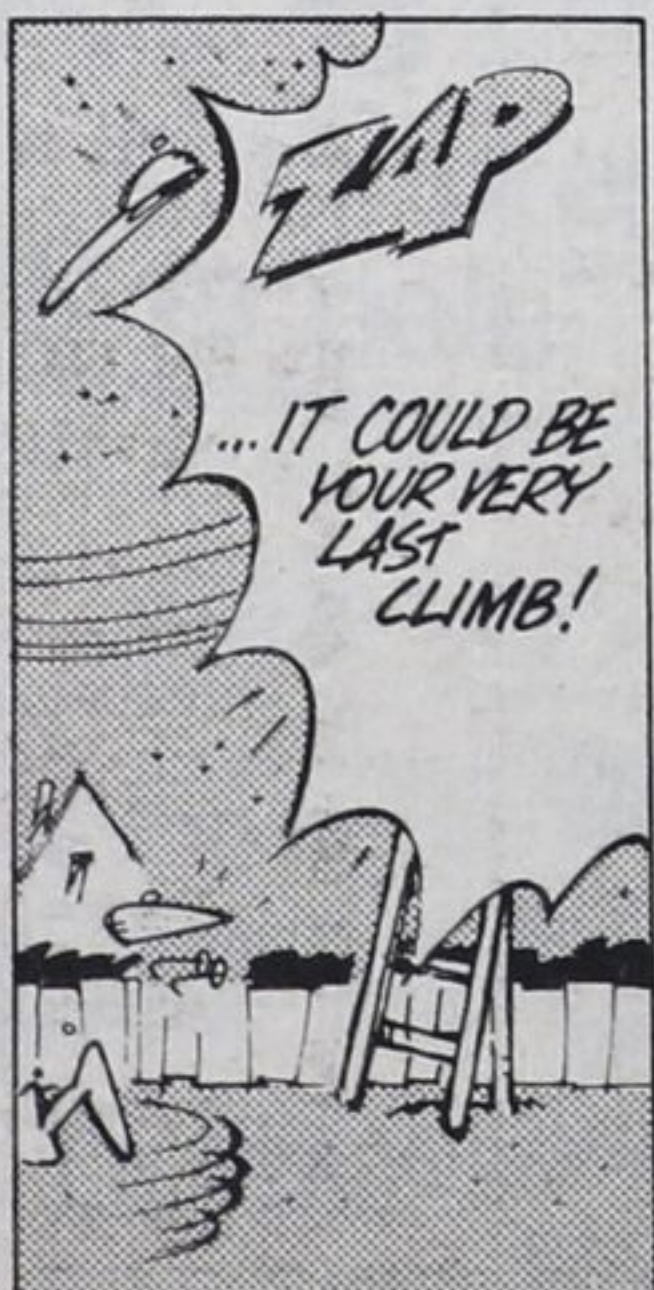
