## OFFER OF \$912,500

# Penetanguishene manufacturer accepts federal contribution

Advanced Extrusions Ltd., Penetanguishene, has accepted an offer of \$912,500 under the Industrial and Regional Development Program (IRDP) of the federal Department of Regional Industrial Expansion (DRIE).

The contribution will be used towards the installation of a high speed aerosol can production line at the company's Penetanguishene plant and to expand the plant by 2,325 square metres (25,000 square feet).

The announcement

was made by Jean Jacques Blais, Minister of National Defence, on behalf of Industry Minister Ed Lumley.

The project is designed to increase production; its total estimated cost is \$3,650,000. The company forecasts added sales of \$6.5 million over three years with 32 jobs created.

Advanced Extrusions also makes other aluminum container products such as aluminum caulking cartridges, collapsible aluminum tubes, marker shells and

## Planned subdivision

A new 55-lot subdivision received approval from the town of Penetanguishene last week at a special meeting of Council.

The town entered into an agreement with Scave Investments Ltd. to provide for the development of the old Therrien subdivision, between Park and West Streets. Town Clerk

offer assistance and incentives to all phases of a company's operation, including

feasibility studies, the setting up of new plants, marketing, expansion, and restructuring.

Yvon Gagne says the developer plans to sell lots and also to build a number of homes for resale. Lots range in size from 60 to 80 feet, "very attractive, treed lots", says Gagne.

The subdivision will be known as "Bay View Park". Three new streets will be built within the development and will be named Therrien Court, Alma Street and Allan Street.

## Fatal accident

According to Midland OPP, Kevin Robillard was a passenger in a 12-foot boat being operated by Henri Marchildon of RR 2, Penetang. Robillard and Mar-

The Penetang teenager was thrown into the water. His body was recovered by OPP divers just before noon the following day.

Name of the driver of the other boat has not as yet been released.

## NEBS Business Forms buys land from town

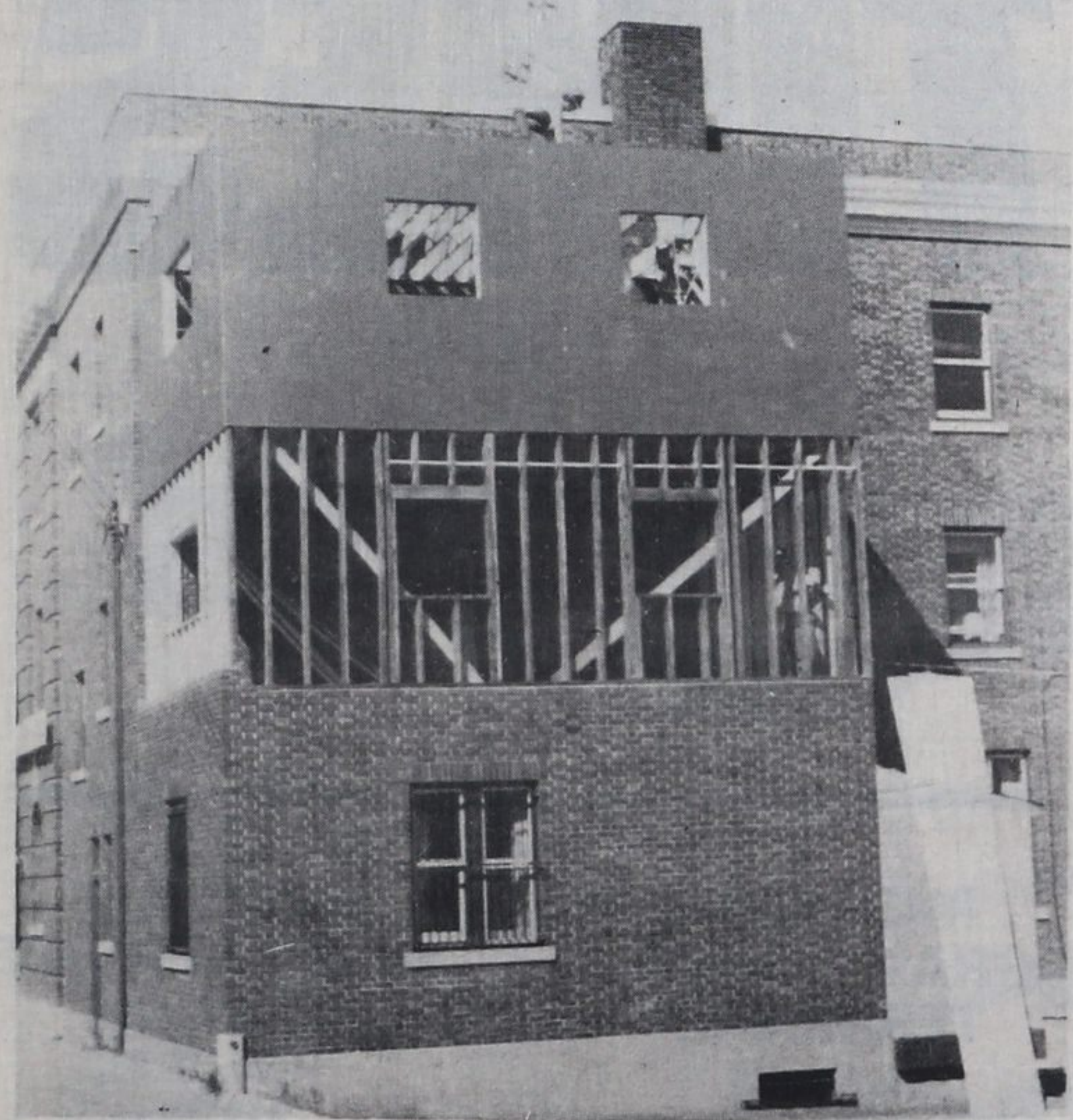
NEBS Business Forms of Midland is spending \$136,500 to become the third occupant of Midland's industrial park, joining Bell Telephone and Fabulous Formals. NEBS has purchased 8.5 acres and has an option to buy a further two acres.

According to municipal figures, \$1.5 million had been spent on the industrial park by 1981. One-third of the \$1.5 million was a provincial grant. To create the park, the town bought 96 acres of land, at the southeast corner of King Street and Heritage Drive. Forty-five acres is available to be built upon. Fabulous Formals and Bell Canada together occupy about 8 acres.

Yesterday, Chamber of Commerce manager Wally Cunningham said that the southern third of the industrial park has yet to be serviced. It will be serviced as the park fills, he said.

Three-quarters of all industrial expansion comes from companies already in a town, according to provincial statistics, Cunningham said. NEBS might have moved away from town if the town had not opened the park, Cunningham said.

While the town is receiving \$136,500 from NEBS, the town has agreed to extend the paved roadway to NEBS new property at a cost to the town of \$97,000. The NEBS property is in the middle horizontal third of the industrial property, west of the Bell Canada building.



## More space

## PROWLERS BEWARE

Trespassing is an offence taken seriously by police as two out-of-town men found out last week. They were arrested on the property of a local school after refusing to leave when asked to do so by staff. They were charged with 'failure to leave premises when directed by police' and were convicted and each was fined \$300 plus court costs. Chief Robert Cummings says, "Prowlers take note: trespassing is a serious offence."

## LOCK UP YOUR BIKE

A word to the wise for cyclists in Penetanguishene: the bike theft season is upon us. Stolen bicycles are hard to trace, as thieves often take them apart, interchange parts and repaint them.

Advice from the local police is: lock your bicycle at night, or better still, keep it inside. Don't leave it unlocked on the street, even for a few minutes - thieves work fast.

## CANOE THEFT

A 12-foot aluminum Sportsman canoe, valued at \$325, was stolen from a Sheridan Street address on Friday, June 15. It is described as having a foam lining with an imitation birch bark outer shell.
