# Business responds to demand by buying land for expansion

NEBS Business Forms Ltd. of Midland is moving from a 35,000 square foot building on Lindsay Street to a 54,600 square foot building to be built in the town's industrial

park. Provision is being made for expansion within eight to 10 years to 110,000 square feet. When the company opened in Canada, in Midland, over eight years ago, NEBS had three employees. Today NEBS employs 72

people. General manager Robert Richardson estimates the work force will double to 150 through the next five years. The chance of expansion to 110,000 square feet in eight to 10 years is extremely good, barring an economic recession, Richardson said.

NEBS Business Forms Ltd. is the only Canadian subsidiary of New England Business Services of Groton, Massachusetts. The parent company is 35 years old.

NEBS designs, manufactures, and distributes business

forms and related supplies to businesses across Canada using Canada Post. NEBS mails 175,000 parcels a year to its 70,000 customers, and several million pieces of advertising and samples. NEBS considered moving in 1981, but held back because of the result on business of a postal strike, and the effect on the general economy of the economic recession. NEBS approached the town about buying land in the town's industrial park less than a month before agreement was reached, on Monday. The company expects its new building will be

available for occupancy before the end of the year.

The Lindsay Street building will be offered for sale.

NEBS has an inventory of 400-450 products. Sales have doubled every five years, Richardson said.

### SHOULD MY WIFE HAVE A WILL, TOO?

If your wife owns property, solely or jointly, or if she is heir to an estate, she should have a will of her own. This rule applies in quite a few other cases, too.

Husband and wife may be double victims in a fatal accident. The husband may have designated his wife as major beneficiary in his will. Without the wife having a will of her own, provision for distribution of her share of the estate will not have been made. Her share may be subject to estate taxes, tying it up for a long period when it may be needed.

If the wife is a partner in a family business, it is to the firm's advantage to have her make a will to ensure its business continuity.

After a husband has made his will, he should discuss with his lawyer a separate will for his wife. Above all, be sure to consult your lawyer. Difficult situations can arise when no wills have been made, or when they have been drawn up by amateurs.
