### GREAT MOMENTS. IN ONTARIO

Delivering hot lunches to the aged and infirm, helping a disabled person to enjoy life to the fullest, counselling a lonely teenages, volunteering time and energies to work on community committees, coaching youth sports teams--all these and many similar activities are tasks performed every day by thousands of Ontario's volunteer workers.

These dedicated volunteers, who selflessly work to improve the quality of life for others in their community, are being honoured this year in celebration of Ontario's Bicentennial. Ontario will recognize some 1,984 citizens for their outstanding community service by presenting to them a specially struck Bicentennial medal. Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, will receive the first of these Bicentennial medals, a gold replica, when she visits Ontario next month.

The medal, struck at the Roayl Canadian Mint, Ottawa, sports the provincial coat of arms on one side and the Bicentennial symbol on the other.

Municipalities are being asked to nominate individuals to receive the medals. The number of nominations per municipality depends on the population but ranges from one to 13. Leamington, for example, with a population of 12,000 may make 5 nominations.

# Huron dinner

Tempt your tastebuds on a typical Canadian Indian meal, Saturday, June 30, when the Kortright Centre for Conservation serves a "Huron Feast", beginning at 5 p.m.

On arrival at Kortright, families can try the hors d'oeuvres of beef jerky and pemmican before going on a "Moccasin Walk".

The Moccasin Walk will show them how the Huron Indians, who lived on the Kortright site 400 years ago, used the natural resources. During the short hike, the naturalist will point out various plants which visitors will collect for making a herbal tea later in the evening.

The buffet style dinner consists of leek and onion soup, roasted Ontario turkey, wild rice, blueberries and strawberries with maple syrup, grape drink, coffee and herbal tea. Dogwood toothpicks will be supplied.

'The movie "To Know the Hurons" will round out the evening.
