

Mulroney dazzles Orillia and Barrie

BARRIE - Simcoe County's Conservatives were treated to a heavy dose of campaign rhetoric Saturday when Brian Mulroney and Bill Davis brought the Tory Road Show to Orillia and Barrie.

Mulroney used the side trip to Simcoe County to boost the hopes of five Tory incumbents in Central Ontario. The peak of the tour came Saturday when the premier and the Conservative leader addressed a packed hall at Barrie's Dunlop Street arena.

What the speeches and rally lacked in substance, they made up for in spectacle, as 5,000 Tories sporting signs, stickers and Canadian flags cheered on their leaders. It was the largest rally so far in the campaign.

Davis said he "had almost become a member of Mulroney's family, maybe the grandfather."

Davis and Mulroney both dropped hints about expanding Georgian College - if Mulroney won the election. It was the only local promise that either leader made. Instead, they focused

their attention at the Liberals, who according to a national poll released earlier Saturday, are said to be losing to the Conservatives by a hefty margin nationally.

"I have come to know our national leader, I have come to know him well," said Davis, "And what has impressed me is his understanding of our province, the recognition that Ontario is the heartland in economic terms of this nation, and his sensitivity to address the concerns of Ontarians and Canadians," said Davis.

Quoting a campaign slogan of Richard Nixon's, Davis said, "He is the kind of person who brings us together."

Mulroney praised Davis, labelling him a "statesman" of international calibre and proceeded to launch into a 40 minute tirade on the excesses of the Liberal party.

Mulroney stressed the word "new" throughout his speech. While accenting the new, he also paid tribute to Tory faithfuls in the Barrie area. He stresses the need of his party for the return to Ottawa of Ron Stewart, one of

Mulroney's supporters in the leadership convention.

And both Davis and Mulroney paid tribute to the late Earl Rowe, former Ontario Conservative leader and Lieutenant governor, who lived on a farm south of Barrie. Earl Rowe Jr. was master of ceremonies at the rally.

Mulroney, perhaps because of his close proximity to Base Borden, spoke at length about what he perceives to be the need to strengthen the Armed Forces and provide the service with better equipment.

He made the pitch during a discourse on youth unemployment.

Mulroney said a Conservative government would make fundamental changes in the way the country is governed, with less strife between the federal government and the provinces, management and labour, and would expand basic research facilities, and provide better economic leadership. "Are we doing as well as we should? Are we doing as well as this magnificent country

can in creating jobs, in securing stability for families that are threatened by technology and foreign competition? Are we doing enough to protect our senior citizens against the ravages of

inflation? The Liberals say that there is something wrong with Canada, that there are deficiencies in this great nation of ours.

"I tell you that there is nothing wrong with Canada, this potentially

strong and productive country. It's the Liberal government that must be changed," Mulroney said.

In the last election, the Conservatives fared well in the Orillia and Barrie areas, but on the

Penetanguishene Peninsula lost to Liberal Al Martin. Organizers of the rally scheduled Mulroney's Saturday visits to the two Tory strongpoints in the county, Barrie and Orillia.

Descendants' Day Aug. 25 happening

The sixth annual Descendants' Day at the Historical Naval and Military Establishments in Penetanguishene is being held Saturday, Aug. 25.

This year's Descendants' Days will feature military demonstrations and music, and a salute to the Drummond Islanders, including special displays on the islanders, on Mackinac Island, and on Michigan. (The British garrison on Drummond Island was abandoned after the north Lake Huron island was ceded to the United States following the War of 1812. Military personnel from Drummond Island and their families were moved to Penetanguishene.)

A genealogical computer area will be set up for the day, with various computer models, genealogical tapes and print-outs, for the benefit of descendants seeking genealogical information. Experts and family historians will be available to answer questions. The schooner Bee will also be open for tours. Descendants' Day is co-sponsored by the Establishments and the Descendants of the Establishment Organization.

Burke Penny, co-ordinator of programs at the Establishments, and staff at the historical site are attempting to expand a mailing list of descendants in an effort to notify as many of them as possible of Descendants' Days. Yesterday, Gwen Patterson, head of the Descendants' Organization, was the Rotary Club of Penetanguishene's guest speaker and spoke to Rotarians about this year's scheduled events.

 NOTICE OF THE PASSING
 OF ZONING BYLAW NO. 731
 AMENDING ZONING BYLAW NO. 533
 AS AMENDED

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Port McNicoll passed Bylaw No. 731 on the 7th day of August 1984, under Section 34 of the PLANNING ACT, 1983.

AND TAKE NOTICE that any person or agency may appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board in respect of the bylaw by filing with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Village of Port McNicoll not later than the 12th day of September 1984 a notice of appeal setting out the objection to the bylaw and the reasons in support of the objection.

An explanation of the purpose and effect of the bylaw, describing the lands to which the bylaw applies, and a key map showing the location of the lands to which the bylaw applies are listed below. The complete bylaw is available for inspection in my office during regular office hours.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT- Bylaw 731 would amend Bylaw 533 as amended, by amending the minimum lot area required in the General Commercial C1 zone. Presently the lot area required is 3 times the area covered by buildings and this amendment proposes to change the requirement to 2 times the area covered by buildings. The amendment is deemed necessary as the present requirement of 3 times the area covered by buildings makes expansion to commercial uses rather difficult. As this is a change to the text only, and would apply to all lands zoned in the General Commercial C1 Zone, a key map is not considered necessary.
