Chretien delights partisans at Liberal rally

External Affairs minister Jean Chretien showed a partisan crowd of Liberals why he will likely be the next French Canadian prime minister at a rally at the Midland arena, Sunday night.

Chretien arrived late at the beer and corn fest Sunday night, but didn't disappoint the crowd of about 500. He gave a strong patriotic speech

that brought the crowd to their feet for several standing ovations.

Chretien attacked the Conservatives as a party that gives shelter to the right wing of the Canadian political spectrum. He said while that party appears to be adopting a middle of the road course, a large number of right wing zealots stands ready to bring in its own policies.

Calling right wing Conservatives dinosaurs, Chretien mentioned Simcoe South MP Ron Stewart.

"You know who supported Brian Mulroney when he ran for the leadership? It was the far right wing of his party. Some of them are about 20 miles right to the rest of society. You have one in the next riding, Stewart. Stewart is what I call a dinosaur.

"I don't say that the Tories are all dinosaurs, what I'm saying is that all of the dinosaurs are Tories. That's why I came back."

Chretien said that, while the country does have some problems under the Liberals, gains have been made in social services and the Constitution has been adopted.

"I'm proud of what we've done. I have nothing to hide. You

remember four years ago, that, if we were still to have a country after the referendum in Quebec, Joe Clark was prime minister at that time, he said to Pierre Elliot Trudeau, 'I don't want to think about it."

After the meeting, Chretien told reporters that the Conservatives in Quebec have given shelter to separatists who seek to weaken federalism by defeating a Liberal government.

"I think that one candidate running for the Conservatives said if there was another referendum, she would vote yes (in favor of

separation) again. If they have converted to the Canadian cause, if they have sworn allegience to Canada, that's fine with me, but I haven't seen that with these people.

"I tell you one thing, the committed separatists don't like

When asked about the possibility of another leadership bid, Chretien joked and said, "you know, we only have leadership conventions every 16 years."

Simcoe North Liberal candidate Al Martin sponsored the rally to give his campaign a

boost and spoke on the state of his election bid.

Martin said the Liberals have a good chance to capture the riding from the Conservatives. After the meeting, he said he has found his support is growing, despite the national perception that the Conservatives are winning the campaign. He said his strength appears to be picking up in the Orillia area and remains strong in the Midland-Penetanguishene region.

Martin, a former member of parliament, lost the 1980 election by only 66 votes.
