

Some people can float through this very intense time without getting in touch with the deeper issues of their lifestyle and lives. The result is perhaps seen in a let down or even depression soon after Christmas because something has not happened. There has to be more.

To me Christmas is a time to celebrate humanity.

I take my cue from a Christian perspective in God became human. We are saved (salvation means whole) becoming through our humanity. first public celebration Jesus attended was a wedding where he sang and danced; he was no Scrooge.
