Midland's mayor was hospitalized by a heart attack in November of 1983.

Last year he was the honourary chairman of the local Heart and Stroke Foundation branch fund raising campaign.

Allan Roach says he is still not as fit as he believes himself to be. His mental assessment of his fitness is not matched by reality.

Soon after his release from hospital Roach began a regimen of a daily walk of two kilometres, which he has kept without fail. He no longer eats margarine, sugar or butter. His response to advice to stop smoking is to smoke 10 cigarettes a day rather than the contents of two or more large packages of cigarettes.

"Blow off steam. Get it out of your system," is his advice. Mental tension is a factor in heart problems, he says. "Go for a walk and think about" the problem.

Roach did not realize he had a heart condition until his attack. Since that attack his weight has dropped to 180 pounds from 220 pounds. He would like to lose 20 more pounds, and could lose 30 pounds according to his medical advice.

"I still have problems. I get tired. I have to learn not to shovel snow," he said this week. February is Heart and Stroke Foundation Month in Midland.

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
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
