SCBE, secondary teachers reach tentative contract agreement

A tentative agreement has been reached in contract negotiations between the Simcoe County Board of Education (SC-BE) and its secondary school teachers, SCBE director of education Dick Boswell said yesterday morning in a telephone interview with this newspaper.

The tentative agreement reached covers the contract period August, 1984 to August, 1985 and, if it is formally ratified by the board and negotiators for the teachers, will result in a retroactive pay increase for the teachers—if there is indeed a pay increase.

No details of the terms of the tentative contract agreement are available yet. The

board is scheduled to meet tonight, and details of the tentative agreement may be known after the meeting. Boswell said information on the tentative agreement will be given to board members tonight. He noted, though, that formal ratification would not come before March 27, when the board is scheduled to meet again.

Boswell said the tentative agreement was reached after a marathon session between board negotiators and secondary teachers' negotiators last Tuesday. Discussions between the two parties lasted until 3 a.m. last Wednesday morning, he said.

Job creation ball served by Ottawa


The federal government "is throwing the ball right at private enterprise" with its summer student employment program, Challenge '85. More than \$200 million is available, more than \$1 million of that in the area including Huronia, Parry Sound and Muskoka.

Employers creating summer jobs for students in the private sector can get half of the wage of the student, up to \$3, from Challenge '85. Municipal jobs will be eligible for a 75 percent of provincial minimum wage subsidy. Non-profit groups hiring students can get a subsidy equal to the provincial minimum wage.
