As to their new location it won't be made known to the Braddocks until May 14.

They are to take part in a "farewell service" at the citadel, June 23.

The Braddocks, parents of four young children, have left their mark on Midland and area since moving here from training college five years ago.

During their tenure, membership in the corps has increased and a new citadel was constructed and officially opened earlier this year.

The Army now operates a Thrift Store in downtown Midland and the Braddocks have been associated with founding a number of half-way homes in the area.

Under the Braddocks, the Salvation Army which is celebrating its 100th year of service in North Simcoe, has conducted a series of very successful Christmas Cheer and Red Shield Drives.

Both dedicated Salvationists have made many friends while in

Midland.

It is expected the local corps will hold a farewell banquet for the commanding officers before they leave the area.

Midland Mayor Al Roach, honorary chairman of this year's Red Shield Campaign - being conducted this month - is quoted as saying, "I've always admired Lt. Braddock's ability to get along with people."

"He and his wife have really put the Army's best foot forward here. We shall miss them when they leave but they can be assured of our admiration for them and for what all they have accomplished in such a short time in Midland."

The mayor added, "Wherever they go, they will be well accepted."

6. Leave after offering your help to the family.
7. Call back in a few days. The family will appreciate your thoughtfulness.
