Applied social researchers program slated for college

A need for trained researchers has led to the development of a new post-diploma co-operative education program being offered for the 1985-86 year at the Barrie Campus of Georgian College.

The Applied Social Researcher program has been developed by

the General and Applied Arts Division to meet the research needs of business, industry, government and social institutions. The program offers specialized career training in behavioral and social science research skills, including courses in

research methodology, statistics, computer applications and report writing.

A research project supervised by the instructors will be conducted through the College's Research Centre. This project will provide students with opportunities to apply their knowledge and skills in a controlled setting.

Simcoe County Board of Education will again sponsor the Simcoe County Summer Youth Band Program for students Grades 7-13. The three-week program will be held from July 2 to July 19 at North Collegiate in Barrie from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

School busing will be provided for students from outside Barrie. Cost of the summer band program is \$100.

A beginning program will be offered for students who have never studied instrumental music before. This "head-start" program will provide private lessons from professional music teachers, performance in small ensembles and junior band classes.

An enrichment

program is being offered for students in the advanced grades, which will further develop the students' performance skills and musical knowledge. Senior students' performance skills and musical knowledge. Senior students will be provided with private lessons from professional music teachers, performance in senior ensembles and senior band classes.

Again this year students will participate in a special 2 day band clinic and special activity days which will provide an opportunity to experience vocal music, jazz band and special concerts.

The Simcoe County Summer Youth Band Program will conclude with a concert which will feature the junior and senior bands and the best ensembles. Successful students will be issued a certificate of achievement and one-third music credit.
