Council held their monthly open meeting last night. It was a Public Hearing to discuss the passing of a bylaw to amend the Official Plan. The Purpose of the bylaw is to set out terms for Site Plan Control; enabling any new builders or owners to submit plans or drawings for compatibility. There were no objections from those present.
Carl Evans made a request for the ditch

behind St. John's United Church to be re-opened. With the hill behind, the parking lot keeps getting flooded. Paul Charlebois and Gerrard LaChappelle will look into this.
Allen Smitten spoke on behalf of the Victoria Harbour Lions Club. They propose to build a parkette, with a sign, plants, and benches at the west entrance to the Village. He will bring in sketches and a model for Council's approval.

The Lions will also be purchasing seven concrete benches to be placed around town.
Mr. Gerwin and Mr. Jordan were concerned about the dust on their roads. They were informed that they would have calcium put down shortly.
There is a five year policy for improvement of the roads within the Village. Beginning with William Street and then on to John Street and Hought. However, this will happen only as the

Village can afford it.
The curbs and sidewalks will go in in May on William St.

His funeral service was held in the Beausoleil Funeral Home, Penetanguishene, on May 10, officiated by President D. Wager of the Midland branch of the Church of

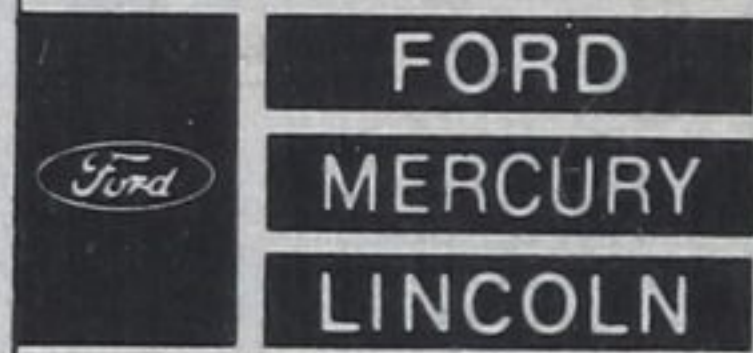
Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Interment was in St. Ann's Cemetery, Penetanguishene.
