Many of the nearly 1,000 Canadians who drowned last year would be alive today if they had used common sense and practiced basic safety skills.

Stop and think - before you get into trouble. That's the message of National Water Safety Week - June 2-9.

Pleasure boaters in particular should prepare themselves before heading out for the first time. Now is the best time to do a safety check on your boat and boating equipment.

The Red Cross recommends that all pleasure boats have: 1. a bailer; 2. extra paddles; 3. a government DOT approved lifejacket or Personal Floatation Device PFS for every passenger; 4. one extra lifejacket; 5. a signalling device.

Red Cross offers a four-hour Small Craft Safety Survival course for adults and children who really want to be safe on the water. Qualified instructors teach survival and rescue techniques and the course is for both swimmers and non-swimmers.

"A course such as the Red Cross Small Craft Safety Survival Course is ideal for families, especially cottagers. We teach through a 'what if?' approach whereby we give an explanation of what should be done. Then we often give a practical demonstration."

"And finally we offer participants a chance to try it themselves," says Jim O'Brien spokesman for the Small Craft Safety Programme.

"We first emphasize safety and then move on to survival skills - a good approach for the beginning of the summer boating season."


