The men and women of this support group are called on to help their full-time counterparts during major emergencies and a variety of events which require a large police presence. The auxiliary officers were used extensively during the 1984 visits of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, and His Holiness, Pope John Paul II.

OPP Commissioner Archie Ferguson said, "These dedicated volunteers deserve praise for committing their time to the welfare of their communities.

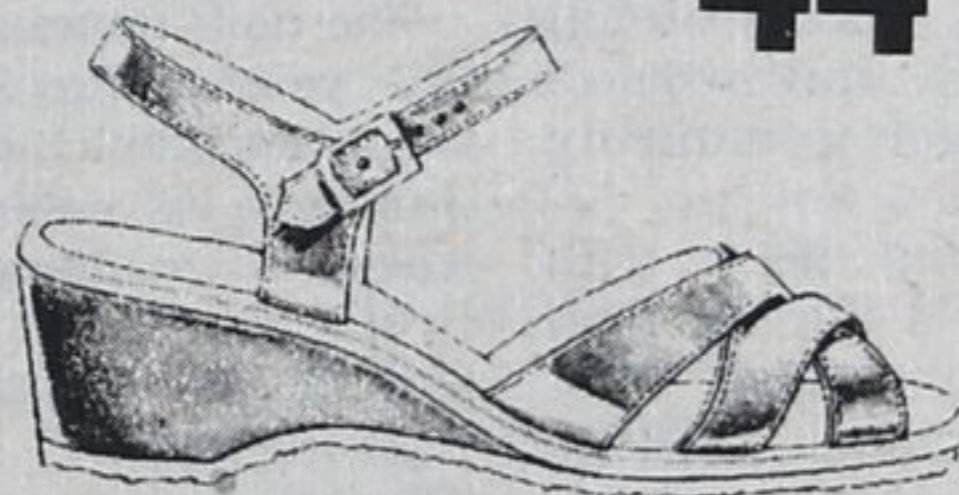
The parade will entail an inspection by Lieutenant-Governor John Aird and the 17 separate auxiliary units will march past with the OPP Pipes and Drums Band.
