

BIA wary of Midland's latest parking plans

In an open letter, distributed last Wednesday to its member businesses, the Midland Town Centre Business Improvement Area (BIA) Board of Directors raised some serious criticisms of a new parking policy proposed for the Town of Midland.

After much study, the Town's Planning and Development Committee intends to ask council for official approval of a "Cash in Lieu of Parking" policy. The plan is to give new businesses the option of paying a fee for parking spaces needed, instead of actually providing the required area on their own property. The "Cash in Lieu of Parking" proposal will also apply when an existing business changes the use of its current building.

The new parking fees, expected to be approximately \$1,500 per spot, would be used to finance the acquisition of new parking properties.

In the opinion of the BIA Board of Directors, "Cash in Lieu of Parking" will be a deterrent to new business in Midland. They believe that parking availability is essentially the responsibility of the municipality, and that BIA member business should be exempt from the new policy, if implemented, because of the current contributions to the Parking Authority in support of free three hour downtown parking.

A delegation from the BIA was scheduled to take these concerns before last night's regular meeting of Midland Town Council.

Consumers wet whistle

Water consumption this summer in Midland is on the rise, reports Art Evans, manager of Midland PUC.

So far this month daily consumption figures have topped the two million gallon mark on more than one occasion.

In June, 52,722,000 gallons of water were used by local consumers. During one 24 hour period 2,117,000 gallons were used after being pumped through the PUC system.

"A couple of days in July we topped 2,300,000 gallons," Evans observed yesterday.

Last August, during one 24 hour period, 2,200,000 gallons were consumed.

\$5,600 in loot still missing

Stolen property, valued at \$5,820, is still missing from a break-in which occurred late last month at Marsh's Marina in Waubaushene.

Entry into the marina was made by forcing open a door, Midland OPP report.

Taken during the daring break, enter and theft were cash, Winario tickets, cheques and smoke (both cigars and cigarettes).

Meanwhile nothing was taken during the same period from Pier 69 also at Waubaushene.
