Just released July statistics for the Town Fire of Midland Department indicate more activity, in almost every alarm category, than for the same month last year.

Firefighters responded to 20 alarms last month, including seven general alarms and 13 silent alarms. Silent alarms are normally answered without a siren by the firemen on duty in the hall only.


