Tall ships coming to Victoria Harbour

If you can't run away to sea, perhaps you'd be content with a visit aboard a graceful tall ship, and a tour of her fascinating facilities.

The brigantines PATHFINDER and PLAYFAIR will be moored beside Queen's Cove Marina in Victoria Harbour this weekend and it will be a perfect opportunity for incurable romantics and camera buffs alike.

On Saturday, Aug. 17, visitors will be welcome for public tours between 2 and 6 p.m., on one of the graceful ships. On Sunday, a brigantine will offer tours between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., and 2 and 6

Both brigs are 72 feet in overall length and are square-rigged with two masts. The PLAYFAIR is easily recognized by her colour. She is one of the few Canadian sailing ships to have been named and blessed by Queen Elizabeth-hence her royal blue hull.

The PATHFINDER is named for a steam yacht owned by Stewart B. Playfair, and carries her namesake's bell aboard.

Both ships were built in Kingston, Ontario-the PLAYFAIR in 1974 and the

PATHFINDER in 1964. As sailtraining vessels, they have introduced hundreds of youngsters to the art of seasmanship. Adults also take training cruises aboard the ships.

While in Victoria Harbour one of the ships will take a group of local young people aboard for a short cruise, sponsored by the Victoria Harbour Lions' Club.
