A new volunteer research program begins in September. After a short training session, then the fun begins!

Says Gwen Patterson, co-ordinator of research volunteers, "This is an area where volunteers can make a very significant contribution to our storehouse of local historical knowledge. We have a total of 24 topics that we need to know more about. They run the gamut from beer-making to the games people used to play in the 1800's."

The volunteer tradition at Huronia Historical Parks is traditionally pleasurable and challenging. Last summer volunteers, 360 strong, worked to make the Papal visit a success.

Michelle Quealey, supervisor of HHP Library Services co-ordinated those volunteers. "It was a profoundly meaningful experience," she recalls, "but it was also a very social thing. After the event was over, we received a lot of letters thanking us for giving people the opportunity to meet so many other people, and to work together with them on something worthwhile."

The Friends of Sainte-Marie and the Establishments Heritage Association are two volunteer co-operating associations which have provided solid support for Sainte-Marie and the Establishments. This past summer, volunteers have run the Candlelight Tours at Sainte-Marie and the Sailor's Sunset Adventure program at the Historic Naval and Military Establishments. Both have been outstanding successes.



Says Michelle Quealey, "I know it will be very gratifying for volunteers to see the incarnation of their research labours as a particular operation takes place on site. 
WHERE CAN A WIDOW GET ADVICE ON FINANCIAL MATTERS?
