10 million visitors to Huronia

The most recent issue of Huronia Happenings, published by the Tourist Huronia Association, estimates that approximately 10 million visitors to Simcoe County will pump more than \$500 million into the area's economy in tourists' dollars by year's end.

Huronia Happenings notes that tourism is the number one industry of the Huronia region. The publication breaks down how the tourist dollar is spent.

They calculate 8.7 cents is spent on accommodations and 8.7 cents goes to activities and individual attractions. Twenty-eight cents is spent on food and beverage, 28 cents on retail shopping and 27 cents on transportation.
