Sherk bills Beamish more than \$100,000

Beamish Construction has been presented with a bill for more than \$100,000 by Sherk Construction. The bill represents the estimated loss to Sherk Construction when Sherk Construction could not work on the Stollar subdivision in west Midland.

Because of a disagreement between Jack Stollar and the town in August, the town ordered both construction companies to stop working. Sherk Construction was hired by Beamish Construction to install underground services in land which will become a housing subdivision.

Yesterday Don Sherk said he expects Beamish will refer his company's bill to Stollar. Sherk's position is that his company lost money through no fault of its own.

Sherk estimated that his company will finish its

portion of the job by week's end.

Stollar has filed a claim of damage asking \$1.6 million of the town as a consequence of the town ordering work in the subdivision to stop. Stollar also announced his intention, on Aug. 20, during a press conference in Midland, to file a second claim of damage against the town, and a third claim, a claim of damage against the town's commissioner of works.

As far as is known neither of those writs has been delivered. Stollar for his part has not taken, or returned, telephone calls, since he held his news conference.

Yesterday his secretary said he would not be in his office until Wednesday. On earlier occasions a reporter was asked if Stollar could return his call.




Controlled access highway


Portions of Hwy. 69 from the intersection of Hwy 12 and extending northerly for approximately 9.8 km to what is known as Lone Pine Sideroad have been designated as Controlled-Access Highway by an Order in Council, dates July 25, 1985.

What this means says Midland OPP is that people should be aware that Regulations in the Highway Traffic Act tell us pedestrians are prohibited from using Controlled-Access highways and also that no person shall operate a bicycle, a motorcycle having a cylinder swept volume of 50 cubic centmeters or less, a a

motorcycle driven by electricity stored in the vehicle, a motor assisted bicycle, a wheel chair on Controlled-Access highways.

Regulation 496 also tells us that this does not apply to a person who resides on lands adjoining the Controlled-Access highway 10 which lands there is no other means of access by highway while such person is engaged in gaining access or egress from such lands and provided that in gaining such access or egress the person proceeds by he shortest route over such Controlled-Access highway to the land.
