'Always room for improvement' says Tay Reeve Tinney

Incumbent reeve of Tay Township Bruce Tinney says that municipal government can always find ways of better serving the people. He says that he, if re-elected, will continue to try to look after the interests of all Tay residents, no matter where a person lives, with equal interest and fairness.

Last year's extravaganza attracted some 50 floats and entries to make it


one of the biggest if not the best Santa Claus Parade in Midland in memory. "We would like to see more bands
