## A stickler for details

Friday was adjudication night for Huronia Players entry in the Association of Community Theatres (ACT) Festival 85-86. Their play, a Doll's House by Hendrik Ibsen, was entered in the Drama Category against 29 other community theatre gorups from central Ontario. Mary Nemis,

chairman of the ACT Festival, described the Festival as a learning experience for the various groups who then had a chance to use the knowledge in their next production. She introduced the Adjudicator, Paul Eck, and outlined his extensive background in stage, TV, radio and teaching theatre

A Doll's House, Eck said, is a play about truth and falsehood in marriage with human emotions in unsparing detail. At the beginning of the theatre of realism, it is a classic feminist play.

There were some "beautiful pieces" in the play, he went on. The cast were vocally clear and used strong physical movements. Costumes showed a good attempt at reality and the properties were suitable to the period. The set made nice use of levels and there were some wonderful pieces of furniture. He liked the use the actors made of the generous stage space.

However, it was soon apparent that in choosing an Ibsen play, the Players had come up against an authority on Ibsen and his times. Ibsen, who was stage manager for his own play, was a stickler for reality and cluttered his stage with detail.

Eck, too, is a stickler for detail.

Raymond Holt, on the other hand, exercised his director's privilege, and chose to have nothing on stage that was not used to further the plot that would distract from what was going on between the actors. It is a legitimate approach to theatre and much in favour. Today, we see Shakespeare done on a bare stage in bluedjeans and T-shirts. It is all a matter of opinion.

Eck thought Tor-Helmer, the leading man, would have an impeccable crease in his trouser legs. Why didn't the Players reasearch this?

They did research. There are excellent facilities to do so--Midland Library and the library at the Historical Parks. The concensus was "no creases in trousers in 1880."

One book on costume told an interesting story about Edward VII, who introduced the fashion of razor-sharp creases down the front of men's always had two pairs of pants made, so he had a pair without the crease to wear when he had to be among more conservative elements of society..


If the Players felt a little let-down with such picky type of criticism, they consoled themselves that it might have been worse. Mariposa Arts Foundation in Orillia were also entered in the Festival. Their leading man literally "broke his leg", no understudy, no time to train another person. The stage manager walked through the role reading from the book

Eck was impressed with the turnout in spite of the foul weather and the fact that an Ibsen drama is not everybody's cup of tea. There were around 100 present. Opening night saw about 70, the next night 100 or so. Saturday, the last night of A Doll's House there was almost 170 on hand. Word of mouth did that. As always the box office had the last word.




