Strike averted among Mental Health Centre psychiatric doctors

MICHELLE GOUETT Psychiatric doctors at Penetanguishene's Mental Health Centre are on the job after an 11th hour agreement

between the doctors and the Chairman of the Management Board Elinor Caplan adverted a planned strike by doctors at four of the 10

psychiatric facilities across the province.

According to Special Assistant to Caplan Helen Flannigan, the doctors agreed to remain on the job when the government agreed to establish a special board of conciliation that will look into salaries and allowance,

along with the two main issues in the dispute, working conditions and the negotiating process.

The compromise between the two sides came at 10 a.m. Friday morning after an all night session between Caplan and the doctors that started on Thursday, at 4 p.m.

Labour mediator Kevin Burkett, who was brought into negotiations in Hamilton at 3:30 a.m. Friday, will chair the conciliation board as a neutral member along with one representative from government and two medical association.

The board will have 90 days to complete the non-binding recommendations dealing with the concerns of the doctors in the dispute that has left them without a contract since April.

Flannigan said the board will examine the working conditions considering workload, secretarial assistance, safety in the workplace, educational leave, legal representation and the mechanism the doctors have for addressing workplace concerns.

Caplan's assistant added the government has also agreed that no reprisal will be taken against any of the of members the association who took part in the study sessions over the last month.

Penetang Library requests for encyclopeadia return

Penetanguishene Public Library is making a public plea for assistance in the recovery of three encyclopeadia volumes mistakenly taken from the facility.

Chief Librarian Rosemary Marchand said the three reference books, all volumes "C", are from the World Book, the New American Encyclopeadia, and the New Book of Knowledge collections.

The books were noticed missing late last week.

Marchand said she realizes it is a rare request to put in the newspaper, but she hoped that maybe someone would read about it, happen to notice the books lying around and return them.

According to the Librarian, it is not a regular practice to publicize when


books are missing, but in this case because they are from complete series', to replace the missing volumes they would have to purchase the complete sets again.

Because the sets of encyclopeadias run anywhere from \$800 to \$1,500, Marchand said it would take a couple of years before the Library could restore them.

The Librarian said she is not accusing anyone of stealing them, adding they could have been accidently taken out without realizing they were to remain in the building.

"I'm not asking anyone to come forth and admit they have the books," said Marchand. "I don't care who has them, I just want them returned."

"We have a drop box where they could be left without anyone knowing who' it is."
