Victims of crime need help

One of crime's greatest ironies is that its victims often suffer a double injustice. Foremost, they are a criminal's victim but then, after an arrest has been made, they are mostly abandoned by the system on which they rely for justice.

The perpetrators have become the traditional focus of police attention. closest personal possessions. There are also the people who have witnessed the crime and will then in suffer the emotional in court.
