

Town boat show

Midland's Town dock is expected to be surfaced by a fleet-load of boats on Sept. 26 and 27 as over 30 exhibitors bring the best they have to the first annual on-the-water boat show. Sponsored by a number of local boat and yacht sales outlets, the event is expected to attract boaters from as far as Toronto.

Director of the event John Brown, of Lakeland Yacht Sales, says the event is sponsored to "promote the local area", both on land and off.

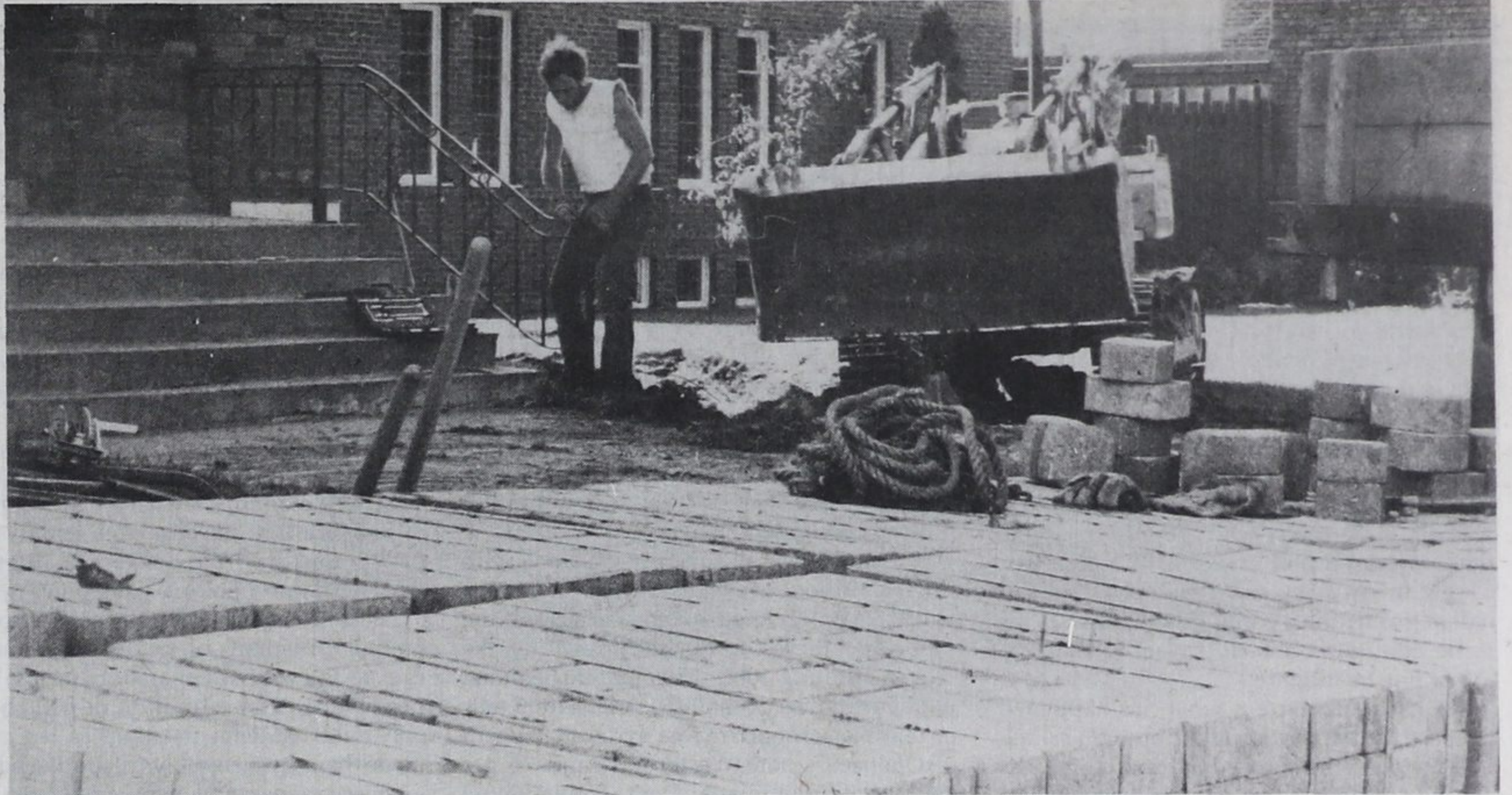
Ninety per cent of the exhibitors at the show will be local, says Brown, adding that only seven will come from out of Town.

He promises that everything from sail boats and runabouts to fishing boats and canoes will be on display and there will be something at the two-day

event for everyone. The H.M. Schooner Bee will leave its home at the Historic Naval and Military Establishment for the event and will dock along the hordes of other boats that will be marvelled at by both home town folks and tourists. The Canadian Coast guard will have a display set up, as will the Canadian Power and Sail Squadron. The Power and Sail Squadron will be offering tips on safe boating practices as well as recruiting for new members.

The main meeting spot at the Town Docks, the Midland Boatworks, also one of the sponsors of the event, will follow the spirit of the event by offering entertainment during and after the show.

"There will be something for everyone there," says Brown.

Dismissal application

Lawyers acting for the limited company, which owns the Midland Free Press, will apply on Friday for dismissal of the libel suit brought against the newspaper and one of its advertisers.

Midland lawyers Gord Teskey, Ross Heacock, and Rod Ferguson initiated the libel suit over an advertisement written by Bill Ogilvie and published by the newspaper in 1983.

The ad, a paid political commentary written by Ogilvie, mentioned Heacock.

According to the notice in Ogilvie's possession, the complainants have not followed a court order to provide the defendants with the law firm's financial records.

Yesterday Gord Teskey said he and his partners "have lived up to everything that we are supposed to live up to."

The defendants want a

list of the law firm's clients and the date on which each client file was opened, Teskey said. The lawyers' position is that the identity of their clients, and the content of their clients' files, is confidential. To let outsiders inspect the files, to determine when they were opened, would be to open the law firm to breach of trust suits by each of its clients, he said. The Law Society has been asked for a ruling, he said.

A copy of each financial statement prepared for the lawyers since 1972 has been provided the defendants, Teskey said.

The plaintiffs will seek a contempt of court ruling of their own on Sept. 29, if Ogilvie has not deposited \$20,000 with the court, Teskey said. Ogilvie lost an appeal of the order to deposit with the court \$20,000, but he has not complied, Teskey said.

The defendants will ask

the court, alternatively, to remove the plaintiffs' action from the trial list until the court makes a further order; to find Teskey in contempt of the court order of June 19; to issue an order for inspection of the records.

The defendants say that because the financial records ordered released have not been received, the ability of the defendants to prepare for trial this fall is impaired.
