Tiny supports stop at clinic

Councillors in Tiny Township have thrown their support behind a suggestion by Midland Mayor Al Roach to reschedule the Town's bus routes to stop on the property of the new Huronia Medical Centre.

At Wednesday's session of Tiny council, discussion evolved a letter from Midland Clerk Fred Flood requesting the councils opinion on a bus route that

would take riders directly on to the clinic property on the Old Penetanguishene Road in Tiny Township.

Councillor Ross Hastings said, "it is an excellent idea and I would support it fully."

According to Flood, he wrote the letter to Tiny on the request of the Mayor who had mentioned he would be taking the proposal to the Town's Public

Works Committee's last meeting. The clerk added "when the proposal for the centre came up before council initially the doctors involved had asked for this type of consideration."

Flood said the municipality will deal with the matter if a recommendation comes to council from the Public Works Committee.

Club wants five young men

Oct. 18 is the deadline for application by young men interested in representing this area in Nigeria for one month.

The Midland Rotary Club is looking for qualified applicants to make up a group of five young area men.

"The team will study the country, its people, culture and institutions through

personal contact with Nigerian Rotarians and their families. The trip is at no expense to the team members, except for any personal expenses," Rotarian Fred Hacker says.

The trip is from March 1 to April 1 of next year. The five young men will represent Rotary International District 701 (which in-

cludes Midland).

"To be eligible for consideration, applicants must be between the ages of 25 and 35 and in good health. Since the team members will be representing Canada as international ambassadors, applicants should have a sound general education and be able to express themselves well. Team members must be enthusiastic for their

chosen vocation and be employed in a recognized business or profession on a full time basis for at least two years prior to making application. Applicants must be Canadian citizens. Rotarians and relatives of Rotarians are not eligible," Hacker says.

PGH's grand finale

Celebrations later this month will mark the end of festivities at the Penetanguishene General Hospital (PGH) to commemorate the anniversary of the 75-year-old institution.

The highlight of the 75th anniversary year will be the hospital's Thanksgiving Mass and Dinner on Oct. 25, according to PGH's Assistant Executive Director Doris Shirriff.

The festive atmosphere around the area will not end Saturday evening at the finish of the reception. A continental breakfast has been organized for the following morning at the Georgian Manor.
