The adventure playground, which has been a source of fun for Victoria Harbour Public School students since the beginning of the school year, was opened officially last Friday afternoon.

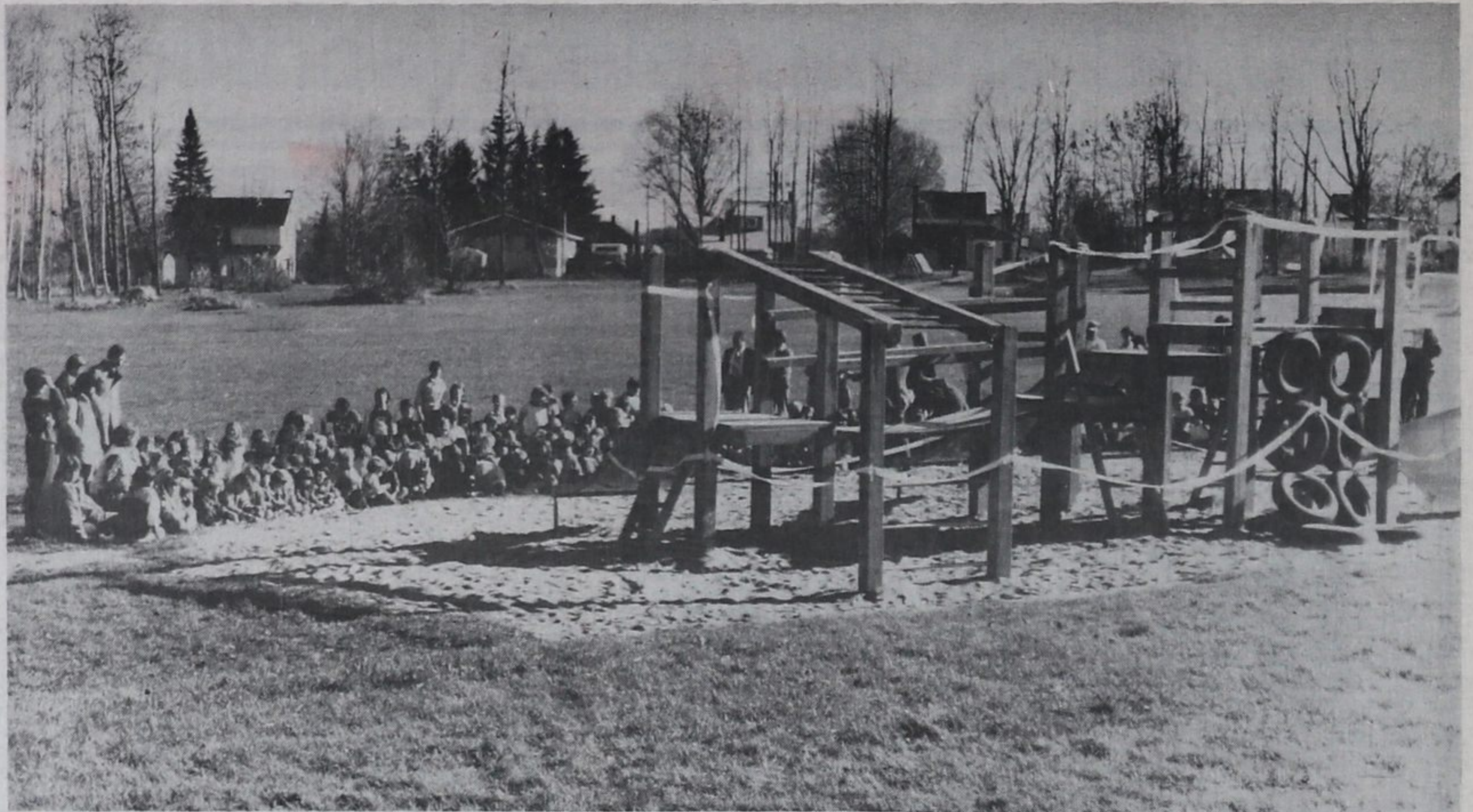
The school's pupils and staff gathered by the structure of ladders and slides built by school parents.

Shedding light in Tiny

Tiny Township Council decided to tour and shed light in areas left in the dark.

The council hasn't decided when the tour for determining the need for street lights will take place. Township Clerk Guy Maurice said the date will be set at the next council meeting, Nov. 12. Council didn't want to pick the date, because Reeve Morris Darby was at a conference in Toronto.

The Township's street light policy doesn't allow for the provision of lights in "seasonal residential zones".

Maurice said about 12 requests from Township residents for lighting will be considered. He also said these areas are becoming permanent residential zones and the Township recognizes the needs of residents there. Areas on the tour will include Woodland, Balm, and Thunder Bay Beaches.

For the first time ever, since the inception of the Penetanguishene Richelieu Club, a woman has been welcomed into the ranks of the organization for French speaking business people.

At their regular business meeting on Oct. 14, club members initiated Marlene Theberge into the Penetanguishene group.

For the last 23 years membership has been limited to men only. Last year however, following a discussion concerning the homogeneous status of the club, members agreed that ladies not only could, but should, be encouraged to become statutory members.

Theberge lives in Crosslands and works in the City of Barrie for the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture. The club's newest recruit will enrich the local membership by contributing her experiences gained in Quebec, the Maritimes and her native northern


Ontario.

Theberge's admission into the club opens the doors to other ladies wishing to join the French speaking business people's organization. The aim of the group is to build personal confidence and to foster communication on a social level with other francophones in the workforce.

Dinner meetings are held every second and fourth Tuesday of each month at the Centre D'Activites Francaises in Penetanguishene. The club has sponsored a variety of local activities in the past. Monies collected from fundraising are redirected into the community to encourage children, mostly to enjoy French cultural activities.
