travelling exhibits from the Royal Ontario Museum's Outreach Department, Pipes of Iroquois, will arrive this week. Pipes today are treated as very ordinary objects-but this was not the case with the pipes of the Iroquois.

For the Iroquois, pipes and smoking had deep cultural and religious significance, and we know that tobacco was an integral part of almost every recorded ceremony. The Iroquois believed that some smoke, lifted up to the heavens, could carry their messages to the Great Spirits.

Pipes were also smoked during business transactions, as it was thought that smoke carried enlightenment to the brain. A shared pipe was a demonstration friendship and hospitality.

The earliest pipes used in Ontario may have left no remains if they were made of destructible organic materials such as bone or wood. But clay pipes from the more recent past are a relatively common occurrence in Ontario.


