Move perceived as politicking

Dear Editor:

In response to your headline of Tuesday, Dec. 16, 1986 "Brown won't keep raise", I would like to point out that not all

members of council are in Mr. Brown's fortunate position of receiving a pension that is probably double that of the general

public and average council member. It is probable that this pension is indexed to the yearly cost of living increases and is a direct result of taxation to the ratepayer by the school board at 52 per cent of the total levy.

Most of the present council will be working 41 per cent harder to earn the increase which is directly in line with that given to non-union members of town staff and only brings us more closely in line with other communities of similar population. As has

been the case previously with the council, we are in a position of instituting another "first" in that all elected members in the future will receive incremental yearly increases and will not have to face the flack for a six year catch up. Perhaps each voter will be now even more thoughtful as to who is to be worthy of their salary.

Mr. Brown would be well to expend his energies on other matters than politicking for the next

election that he contends he will not be taking part in. Only the success rate for the town will measure our worthiness of another term. There is more going on now due to increased development and interest in Midland's future by outside groups and we councillors have more to do than rack up political "Brownie Points" for the next election.
