

1986 a Year in Review

Township and Marchand headline July's news

Major headlines were made by Tiny Township officials in July when the group withdrew from the six member North Simcoe Waste Management Association (NSWMA) when the other representatives refused to all Tiny to single-handedly continue the search for a replacement for the Pauze landfill site and refused to abandon a proposal for a new dump on a parcel of agricultural land in the south end of the township.

Provincial mediator Michel Picher, who was on hand at the special meeting on July 22 said the move was very unfortunate.

On July 23, Jacques Marchand was notified that he had won his suit against the Simcoe County Board of Education and the Ontario Ministry of Education for equal rights for the French language minority students in the Penetanguishene area.

Marchand took the case to the Ontario Supreme

Court in 1984 when requests by a group of parents to improve the facilities at the four-year-old institutions to the school board were denied.

The Town of Penetanguishene looked into a move that would alleviate traffic congestion at the corner of Champlain Road and Robert Street. It would also give transient riders a permanent home in town. According to Town Administrator Yvon Gagne, officials were look-

ing at the possibility of moving the pipe, on the west side of Champlain Road, where many area residents and cottagers stop for fresh water, across the road, next to the pumping stations. Gagne said as well a small area could be cleared on the town-owned land to allow for the roadside vendors to set up shop.

Penetanguishene Bottling-Compny applied for the necessary bylaw changes so that it could expand its plant. The laws involve rezoning land from residential to commercial, and if rezoned, the company could build a larger warehouse.

Early in the month, Penetanguishene politicians and workers hoped all homes in town would be completely serviced by sewers by year's end. Council decided to spend just over \$695,000 to finish the sewer construction.

In the same vein, Tiny Township council began making plans for a new water system in the northern section of the Georgian Sands subdivision. The five council members agreed to begin going through the proper channels to have the proposal for the three-phase construction under the Local Improvement Program approved by the Ontario Municipal Board.

In an effort to agitate members of the Midland Town Council, over the dismissal of the town's complete engineering department, organized labour got into the action. Members of the Ontario Public Service Employees Union presented their grievances about the Council's action to the town.

Like Ontario physicians, who a month earlier walked out of their offices in an effort to show their dissatisfaction with the Liberal government's Bill 94, area dentists got in on the fight.

To show their anger over Bill 94, the ban on extra-billing, the 11 members of the Huronia Dental Society refused to do any dental surgery at the Huronia District Hospital or the Penetanguishene General Hospital. With the passing of Bill 94 by the provincial government, the dentists could not longer bill their patients the difference between the amount of money OHIP would pay for hospital dental surgery and the dentist's office fees.

Early in the month, Robert Morton, administrator at the Georgian Manor in Penetanguishene unveiled a \$2.9 million retrofit project for the

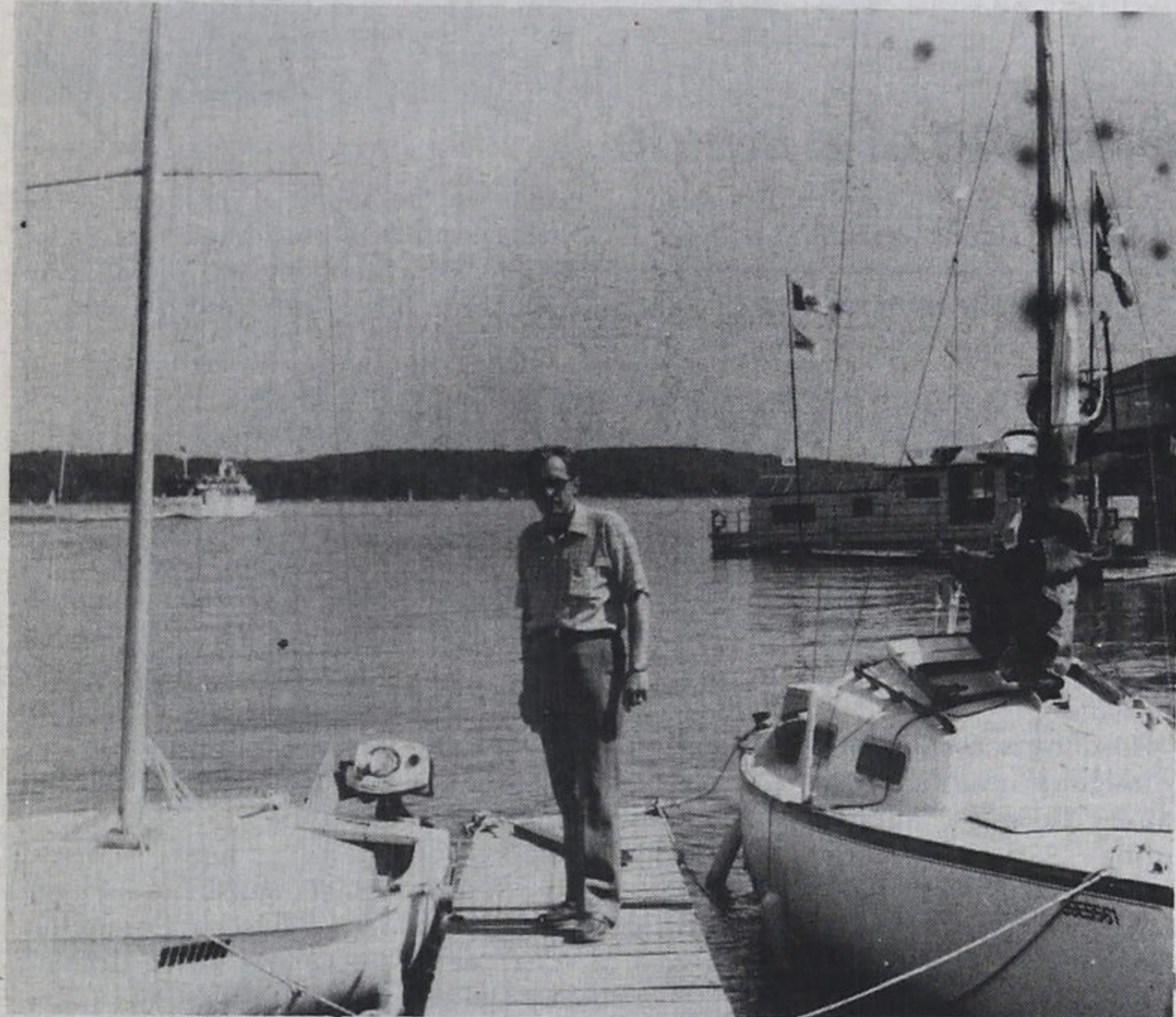
home for the aged at a meeting of the Simcoe County Council. Although the proposal did not call for an increase in the number of beds at the 105 bed facility, it did call for the upgrading of the facility.

Fire was responsible for the destruction of another local drinking establishment in Port Severn. On July 14 a local dance hall was completely destroyed when a fire broke out in the kitchen of the Port Severn Tavern. It took firefighters from Tay Township and Honey Harbour until late

in the evening to finally extinguish the blaze. No one was injured in the blaze.

Midland Town council gave their seal of approval in July to the construction of an 80 unit retirement home in Midland on King Street. Council had to rezone the property to allow the construction of the home which was to be in August.

During the month of July, the Ontario Supreme Court handed down a decision that would set precedent for the rest of Canada in a case involving a Lafontaine resident.
