Attractions concerned

Local tourism industry leaders are saying locating the new dump on the Wayne Johnson farm could seriously threaten the development of the area's attractions.

The directors of the Martyr's Shrine, Sainte-Marie Among the Hurons and the Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre wrote a letter to the North Simcoe Waste Management Association to voice their concern.

"We respectfully insist that you reconsider the development of the Johnson farm (site 41) as a waste disposal site for North Simcoe."

Signed by Huronia Historical Parks General Manager John Barret-Hamilton, Father James Farrell, the Director of the Martyrs' Shrine and Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre's Executive Director Bob Whittam, the letter stresses the educational, economic risks natural associated with locating a dumpsite on the Wye River watershed in the south end of Tiny Township.

The directors voiced their concerns during an Oct. 9 meeting with NSWMA Chairman Lionel Dion, but wrote him back to say "We are still left with much anxiety over the potential for environmental damage to the Wye Valley watershed from a landfill on site 41."

Tiny Township councillors have also received a copy of the letter to Dion and are sending a copy to their lawyer as they seek to fight the NSWMA on its choice of a dump later this year before the Environmental Assessment Board. The Township's opposition to site 41 caused them to split from the cooperative organization last summer.

PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

and your 1987 Municipal and School Taxes

Regional Assessment Offices located throughout Ontario are responsible for assessing all real property for the purposes of municipal and school taxation.

The resulting Assessment Rolls are delivered to municipalities which use them to set their mill rates and compute municipal property tax bills.

The amount of property tax you pay on your home or business depends on the assessed value and the mill rate set by your municipality. The assessed value multiplied by the mill rate will determine your 1987 property taxes.

Open House Sessions

Open Houses are your opportunity to fully understand your assessment and to evaluate its equity.

Open Houses are held in every municipality at convenient times and locations to provide you with the opportunity to discuss your assessment with staff of the Regional Office.

An assessor will be pleased to explain the basis of your property assessment and is authorized to amend any inaccurate information prior to the delivery of the Assessment Roll to your municipality.

If you have any questions but are unable to attend the Open House, please contact your Regional Assessment Office at the address or telephone number shown below.

Assessment Notice

Property owners and tenants will receive an Assessment Notice only if information relating to their property or assessment was changed during the past year, if the assessment was appealed last year, or if there has been a general reassessment in the municipality. If you receive an Assessment Notice, it may reflect changes you have requested in your school support designation, in the amount of your assessed value, or other recorded information on last year's Notice.

Appeal Procedure

If, after attending your local Open House, you are still dissatisfied with your assessment, you have the right to appeal it to the Assessment Review Board. The Assessment Review Board conducts informal hearings and is responsible for determining whether the assessment under appeal is fair and equitable with the assessments of similar properties in the vicinity or neighbourhood, and may alter your assessment accordingly. **Appeal Deadline**

The final date for appealing your assessment is February 26, 1987.

Your appeal must be forwarded, either on a Notice of Appeal Form or as a letter, to the Regional Registrar of the Assessment Review Board on or before February 26, 1987, noting your property address, roll number and the reason for the appeal.

To assist you, Notice of Appeal forms and the address of the Regional Registrar of the Assessment Review Board are available at Open Houses, your Regional Assessment Office, or your municipal office.
