# Kings continue on winning track

Penetang Junior C Kings skated to a 7-5 triumph over Oro 77's Friday night at Penetang Arena in Georgian Bay Junior C Hockey action in their last scheduled regular season game.

Oro's Dave Gillespie struck first with a tally at the 52 second mark, but Paul Bumstead clicked with Brent Dubeau at 2:10. Ken Hughes notched his first of three on the night as he lifted Oro into a 2-1 lead. However, Rob Desroches connected at 12:06 assisted by Gilles Charlebois and Perry Beausoleil, before Beausoleil converted passes from Bumstead and Mike Brunelle just over a minute later for a 3-2 Penetang lead going into the second period.

Hughes knotted the score for Oro to start the middle session, but Scott Boyd returned the favor midway in the frame with help from Charlebois and Brunelle. Steve Ingram struck for Oro at 11:36 for a 4-4 tie, but Boyd broke the tie a minute and a half later with Gary

Lynch in on the play. With just 27 seconds remaining in the period, Lynch gave Kings their first two goal lead of the contest from Beausoleil and Charlebois.

Boyd increased the Pentang lead to 7-4 to complete his hat trick at 6:50 of the third period assisted by Lynch and Brunelle. Hughes fired his third at the 14 minute mark

to complete the game's scoring.

Oro outshot Penetang on the contest 33-29, while Kings took 52 of the 98 penalty minutes assessed.
