

Marlin Travel oust Ingersoll

Midland Marlin Travel Peewees received a warm welcome in Ingersoll on the weekend in their quarter final OMHA series. Welcome Midland signs, free donuts, milk and coffee, and even a dance greeted the Midland fans and parents.

In the first game, Ingersoll took a 2-0 lead on a power play goal and then a short handed marker. Midland struggled at first as they weren't used to playing on a smaller ice surface and experienced difficulty clearing the puck from their own end.

Chris Bales opened the scoring for Midland on a breakaway at 10:31.

In the second frame, the Marliners capitalized on a pair of Ingersoll penalties as Doug Summers from Chris Bales slapped the puck into the net. Bales then flipped in a Steve Graham drive from the blue line for a 3-2 lead. With two minutes remaining in the period, Ingersoll notched the equalizer.

Midland was faced with killing off four minutes in penalties starting the third period. Ingersoll scored at 6:26 and Midland answered two minutes later as Chris Kinnear pushed in a pass from Bales and Doug Summers

which sent the contest to overtime.

Midland dominated in the extra period as they fired three tallies. Graham, Summers, and Cory McGibbon connected for Midland.

The Marlin Travellers faced Ingersoll again Sunday and went to work early as Craig Dempsey clicked at 12:10 unassisted. Summers from Bales and Dempsey from Larmand lifted Midland to a 3-0 lead. Ingersoll got one back late in the frame.

Dempsey and Larmand combined for a marker in the second stanza for a 4-1 lead.

Ingersoll mounted the pressure in the final frame and notched a short handed goal, but Midland struck on the power play as Craig Dempsey hit paydirt assisted by Chris Bales. Midland hung on for a 5-2 victory thus eliminating Ingersoll.

Jason Nicoll and Danny Hartly played extremely well in the Midland nets during the series.

Midland Marlin Travel Peewees now will face Stouffville this Friday at 9 p.m. in Stouffville. Next home game will be Sunday at 2:15 p.m.

Annual Winterama tourney exciting

Penetanguishene Winterama weekend featured the first annual Atom/Peewee hockey tournament sponsored by Penetanguishene Minor Hockey Association.

PMHA hosted 16 teams, eight atom and eight peewee in the three day affair.

In Atom division first round play, Aurora doubled the count on Penetang 6-3, while Newmarket defeated Downsview 7-3. Collingwood nipped Parry Sound 3-1 and Orillia climbed all over Saltfleet 9-2.

In second round action, Penetang rebounded with a 5-2 win over Downsview, while Aurora kept on the winning track with a 9-1 pasting of neighboring Newmarket. For the second game in a row, Orillia scored nine goals, this time shutting out Parry Sound. Collingwood remained consistent with a 3-2 victory over Saltfleet.

Saltfleet and Downsview played to a 1-1 third round stalemate, but Saltfleet was declared the winner as they scored the first goal of the game sending them to the Consolation final. Newmarket earned the other Consolation berth with a 2-0 win over Parry Sound, while Orillia dashed Penetang's hopes of advancing with a 3-1 win. Aurora became Orillia's opposition in the Championship final with a 5-2 win over Collingwood.

The final contests were certainly entertaining as Newmarket was forced into overtime to take the Consolation title from Saltfleet with a 5-4 victory. Orillia nipped Aurora 3-2 in dou-

ble overtime for the grand championship.

In Peewee action, Penetang Driftwood opened up with a 5-3 win over Richmond Hill, while Collingwood climbed over Orillia 8-1. Bracebridge downed Oakville 6-1 and Erin whitewashed Barrie 9-0.

In the second round, Bracebridge continued their winning ways with a 9-1 triumph over Richmond Hill. Penetang remained undefeated with a 2-0 shutout of Oakville and Barrie evened their record

with a 7-3 decision over Orillia.

Erin and Collingwood played to a 6-6 tie in third round play, while Richmond Hill eked out a 3-2 win over Oakville. Barrie blanked Orillia 5-0, while Collingwood deposed of Penetang 5-3 and Bracebridge squeezed by Erin 3-2.

Two more close encounters of the hockey kind took place in the peewee finals. Barrie captured Consolation honors by virtue of a 3-2 overtime victory over Richmond

Hill. Bracebridge were awarded the Championship trophy by defeating Collingwood 4-3 in regulation time.

At the conclusion of second round play, tournament organizers awarded both Parry Sound Atoms and Bracebridge Peewees with the Most Sportsmanlike Team Trophies.

Tournament chairman, Bill Couling and his staff presented all championship teams with trophies, medallions and tournament banners in both divisions.
