Harbour residents rate increases

Village of Victoria Harbour residents will be faced with an increase in their water and sewer rates despite their opposition to the hike by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment.

Earlier this year, the village council launched appeals with the Ministry of the Environment against a 140 per cent increase in the sewage service charges and increases in the water rates.

As a result of the withdrawl of the appeal, the village will be responsible for payment of over \$155,000 to the ministry for water and sewer.

Although the council originally supported an appeal of the hikes, that saw the sewer rate jumping from just below \$5 a month to \$12, council has rescinded their appeal as a result of a deal struck with the ministry.

Earlier this year, MOE officials agreed to write off over \$555,000 owing the municipality.
