Rain brings out marsh habitants at wildlife centre

Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre has the answer for those long summer days when there's nothing to do.

Rainy days are special at Wye Marsh. It's the best time to see birds, turtles, and other wetland and woodland creatures which hide from the hot sun, and there are always beautiful wildflowers in bloom.

Bring your umbrella and raincoat for a walk on the self-guiding nature trails. You're sure to make some

exciting discoveries, and the Wye Marsh naturalists are on hand to help you identify the wildlife you find.

Too hot to be outdoors? You'll stay cool in the Wye Marsh display hall, and there's lots to see and do for visitors of all ages. For young people, a colouring corner, the Marsh Trivia Game and Beaver Game are entertaining. The Wye Marsh staff will be glad to

show you nature movies and slides in the theatre. Ask to see the collections of insects and plants of the Wye Valley, and visit Wye Marsh's library of natural science books.

In the display hall, you'll find a busy beehive, aquariums of native fish, amphibians, and reptiles, and informative displays about acid rain, radio telemetry (bugged wildlife) and the unique exhibit "Whales - Fragile Giants of

the Sea." La Cache, the Wye Marsh gift shop, has a wealth of nature books, guides, gifts and souvenirs to please everyone.

Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre is located east of Midland on highway 12. Open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Admission: free to members, \$3 for adults, \$1.50 for seniors, students and children. For more information, phone the centre at 526-7809.

Also at Midhurst, congratulations were extended to agency counsel, Doug Manning, and his wife Vivian on the birth of their first child, a son, Matthew Corey.

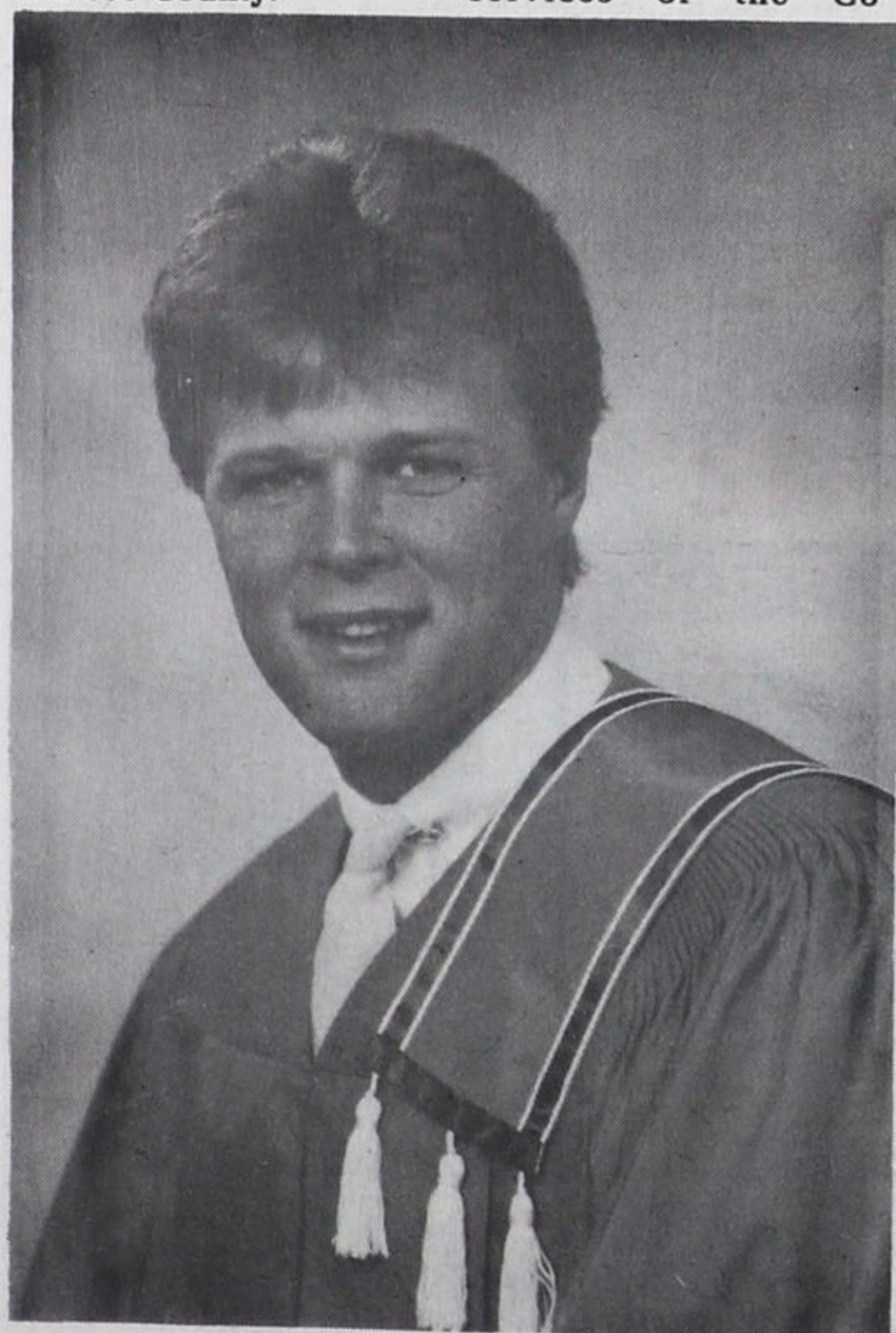
