Crime Stoppers hopes to solve Oro murder

Crime Stoppers of Simcoe County and the District of Muskoka, along with the Barrie Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, request the public's assistance in identifying the persons responsible for the murder of a young woman in Oro Township.

During the early morning hours of Sept. 1, 1983, Claire Samson, age 23, a prostitute known as Casey, was seen standing in front of the Essex Hotel on Jarvis Street, Toronto. She got into a large size, beige car that was driven by an older, balding male person, and taken away. She was not seen again.

On Friday, Sept. 2, 1983, Samson's body was found in a woodlot area off Oro Sideroad 20/21, near Highway 93 at Crown Hill, just outside of Barrie. She had been shot in the head with a small calibre weapon.

Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$1,000 cash to anyone who provides information that leads to an arrest in this case or any other case.

Callers are never required to reveal their identity or testify in court.

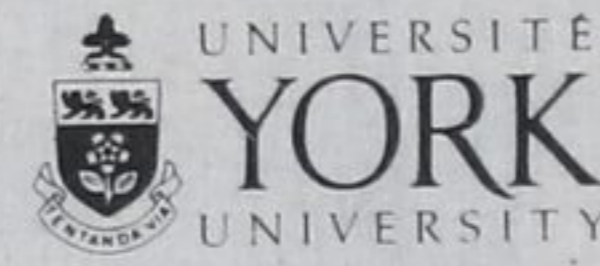

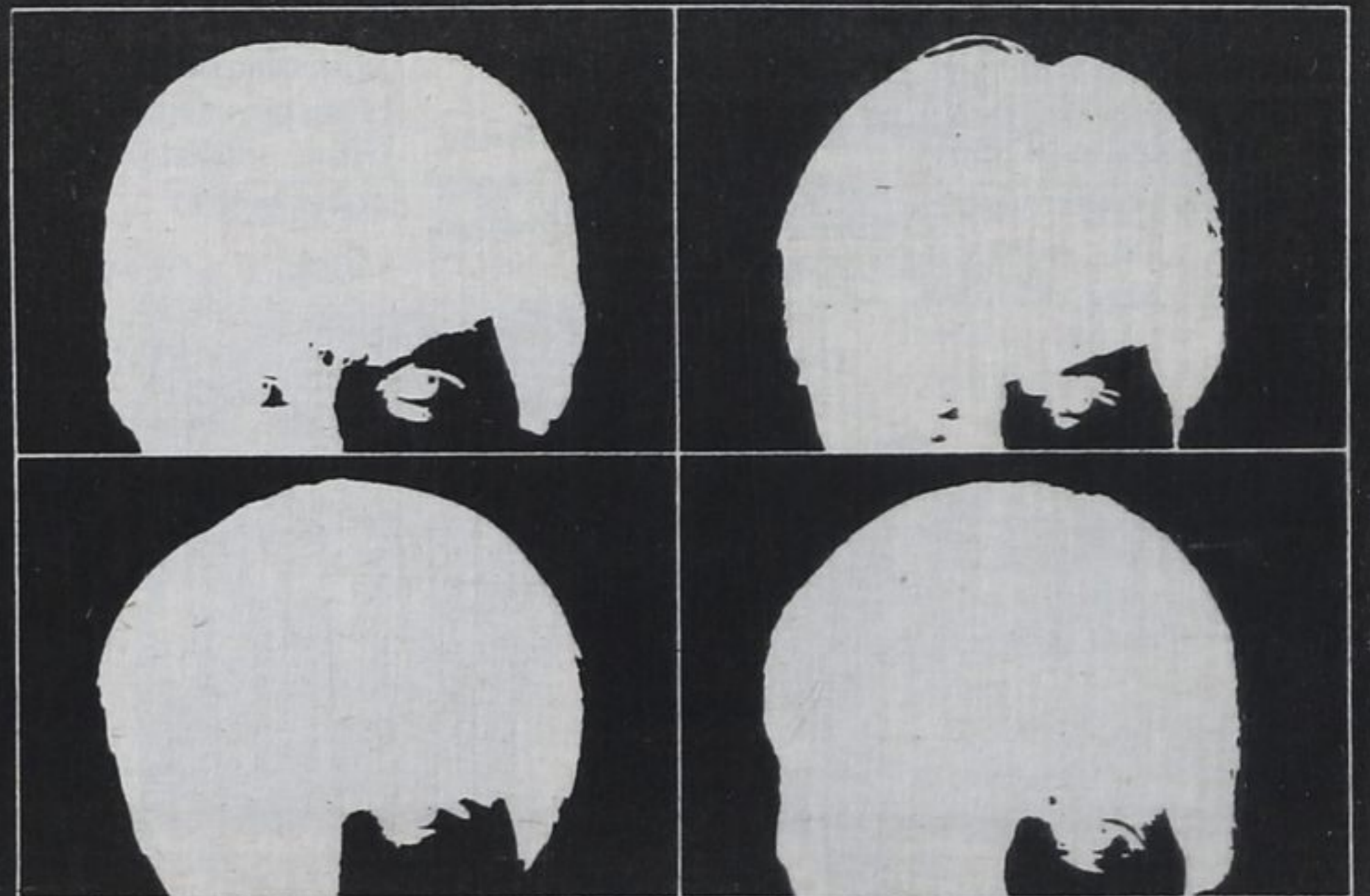
