psychiatrically disabled in life skills. Simcoe County will receive Minister Murray Elston announced Aug. 17.

Penetanguishene will receive \$186,437 operating costs and \$26,923 in start-up costs to house another five individuals with psychiatric disabilities. It will have a staff of seven to provide 24-hour supervision and support for residents, as well as vocational assessment and training in a community setting.


#### Important Notice 1987 Final Taxes Levied
