What is too thick to swim in and too thin to plow? Answer: the Wye marsh.

The Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre is going to change that, with the help of Ducks Unlimited.

A "cookie cutter machine" will chop the cattails and make channels in the overgrown marsh. Visitors who walk to the end of the boardwalk can't see much open water.

Ducks Unlimited, a conservation group, also has proposed to supply pumps to lower temporarily the level of water inside the marsh, so that some of the vegetation would die.

Civilization has disrupted the natural 10 year cycle through which the water in the marsh would rise and lower by itself, Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre director Bob Whittam told the Midland Rotary Club last week.


