Upon hearing gunfire, another group of soldiers was to open fire and move in from another side. Strong wind kept the gunfire from the ears of the second body of soldiers. Middleton withdrew, without knowing that the feint had been a success.

"As Middleton sat down to lunch minutes later, the Midlanders, under Lieutenant Colonel Williams, broke through the weakened Metis lines near the church."

"The battle was over in minutes as the Field Force swept down the slopes to Batoche, past rifle pits where by now the Metis were firing nails and stones from their rifles," according to the account of the battle provided visitors to the historic site.

"Riel and Dumont escaped. Riel gave himself up later but Dumont fled to the United States. Those who had not dispersed were captured and held for later trial in the courts. Over 25 dead from both sides were counted when the battle ended."
