Alderman wants policy enforced

Any town employee who doesn't wear safety equipment while doing hazardous work should be sent home without pay, says alderman Fred Pilon.

"Tomorrow morning if the men are not wearing safety-goggles or boots then they should go home for the entire day and lose a day's pay," Pilon said at a public works committee

meeting.

Pilon said he was incensed when he saw some town employees cutting cement while the goggles they are supplied with sat unused.

Public works manager Ken Cave said he would enforce the safety policies more strictly.
